


The Capital Budget adopted at the spring town meeting included funding very important to the high school. Our library will be renovated!!! It will be reorganized and "opened up" by repositioning the stacks, taking down concrete half walls, and making different use of available space. CHS ALUMNUS PROFILE By Kristin Morris Thomas ('87)

MEHMED ALI

Mehmed Ali truly loves, and lives, for his job. The day I spoke to him for this interview he was scheduled to leave for Iraq in less than one week to do what he does best – preserve history and promote cultural understanding.

This new challenge of doing such a task in at a dangerous post did not deter Mehmed at all; the excitement in his voice was ever-present as he spoke of the new role he would take on in this country trying to rebuild after war.

"Imagine what you could be if you applied yourself," is the advice Mehmed gives to the students at CHS. He describes himself as a bad boy while in high school – an "ok kid with some attitude." Angie Taranto worked well with him, inspiring him to continue on and work hard. Earlier in eighth grade he

credits teacher Geoff Hall for his tenacity in seeing that he succeeded. Mehmed knows he didn't live up to his own full potential at this time; he would only to discover where his talents lay later on in life.

It wasn't until Mehmed was studying at the University of Hawaii and the mother of a friend sent him a book on the history of Lowell that he was hooked. Ironically, it was the path from halfway across the world that brought him back to his roots. From Hawaii, he returned and wrote for the Lowell Dispatch News, and later worked for the Lowell Historical Society. When the position for the Director of the Patrick J. Morgan Cultural Center for the Lowell National Park opened up, it was only natural that he becomes the candidate and recipient of the job.

The official title for Mehmed's new position is that of Cultural Affairs Specialist within the Iraq Transition Assistance Office. He will serve in this position for a minimum of one year, with the opportunity to return to the States only three times. For him, one of the toughest parts will be being away from his daughter, who is six years old. This will be the fourth federal agency for which Mehmed has worked; government service is no new idea for him. In many ways, this position will be an expansion of what he has accomplished in Lowell. "This will be like working with the city," he stated, "but now it's on a nationwide basis." He will help put Iraq's museum's back online, organize cultural exchanges and events between the United States and Iraq (such as an exchange of performers), and create special events. Above all, one of the most exciting

aspects of the job he sees is the opportunity to have the Iraqi people use their own resources to help themselves. By bringing forth the skill set he has learned in Lowell, he can help facilitate those in Iraq to re-ignite their magnificent and ancient culture and traditions.

I could list the numerous contributions Mehmed has made to our local area – the ones which were listed in 2007 when he was inducted into the Chelmsford Alumni Association's Hall of Fame. The list is long and distinguished. I was ready that day to ask him about his career path, but seeing his excitement about his new post made those questions dissipate rather quickly. Let's hope Mehmed sends us news of his new endeavors in Iraq. I am sure they will be just as noteworthy, if not moreso.

forward to this new phase of his life while still enjoying the remainder of his senior year, especially senior week activities.



It was sometime between the salad being cleared from the table and the chicken parm arriving that it hit me: this Chelmsford High Hall of Fame induction was truly a family affair. And it wasn't just because I caught a glimpse of inductee Sal Lupoli's kids making a fuss over their dad a few feet away from the head table. Speaker after speaker – inductees and those paying tribute alike – spoke of its importance, both immediate family and their extended one at CHS.

Lupoli, the stellar football lineman and captain from the class of '84, was inducted not only for his prowess on the gridiron, but for his highly successful Sal's Pizza chain which now boasts some 40 stores and 400 employees. He and his brother Nick founded the venture upon his graduation from Northeastern University with a business management degree, where he also starred on the football team.

"If you can't count on family...." Lupoli said, taking a deep breath. "Mine supports me on a daily basis. The rock, my advisor... you can be as good, but you can't be any better than my mother Jeanette. "My brother," he said to Nick, "you are the wind beneath my wings. Nick, I can't begin to tell you how much I love you and how blessed I am to have you," Lupoli continued.

He also paid tribute to his late father, Nick, who died in 2003, and late brother, James, who died suddenly in 2007, and thanked his wife, Katie, with whom he still lives in Chelmsford. To his kids, Mary, 10, and Sal Jr., 7, he said, "You are Daddy's heartbeat."

And as many speakers before and after him at the 18th annual induction ceremony March 8 at the DoubleTree Riverfront Hotel in Lowell did, Lupoli gave a special nod to the Chelmsford High family that also helped shape him, especially his football coaches who were in the audience: Tom Caito, Jack Fletcher and Bruce Rich.

"What sports has done for me is help shape the man I am today," he said, noting how he was taught "teamwork, dedication and leadership," cornerstones of success in business as well as sports.

Inductee Michael Tate, a retired science teacher, also spoke of the teamwork in his 31 years at CHS.

"To have a job you enjoy so much that you never say 'I don't want to go in today," is a rare privilege, Tate said. "Things like that mean so much." His science department colleagues "were always willing to try something" new. "They make you look good."

Tate also thanked the administrators at CHS for being supportive. Simply put, he said, "They let you teach."

Inductee Bernie Ready was also effusive in his praise of his former bosses and colleagues. The affable retired teacher is credited by Chelmsford High Alumni Association Executive Director George Simonian with saving the Chelmsford Ginger Ale sign from "oblivion" when the retail strip where it still stands opened on Acton Road some years ago.

"George Parkhurst be proud," Simonian said, referring to the late, noted town historian. When it was his turn at the podium, Ready quickly returned the accolades. "Long before Barack Obama was born, (Simonian) was a 'yes we can' kind of guy," Ready said. Thanks to Simonian's efforts in the community and particularly the alumni association, "CHS is the heartbeat of the town of Chelmsford," the 35-year teacher said.

Sheila Anderson Kirschbaum, an inductee from the class of 1972, also heaped praise on the teachers who helped shape her career as an educator. Kirschbaum, who has taught at Alvirne High in Hudson, N.H., Rivier College, and now a school liaison and professional development coordinator at the Tsongas Industrial History Center in Lowell, thanked her former history teacher, Bernie Battle, for his advice: "College is what you make of it," and her former math teacher, Jack Conrad, who helped her through a tumultuous year in algebra where she finished with a C+. "I almost cried," she said, at having pulled her grades up by term's end. But Conrad, always encouraging, told her: "You earned this!."

One inductee, Edward Cetaruk, class of '82, couldn't attend, as he was attending a medical conference in San Diego on toxicology and counterterrorism. In a letter Simonian shared with the packed house at the hotel's grand ballroom, Cetaruk wrote that it was "a great honor to even be considered" for the hall of fame. Cetaruk is a teacher and lecturer at the University of Colorado's medical school and has written countless papers and run seminars on biological terrorism and homeland security.

Cetaruk's accomplishments weren't the only ones of the night with a military hue. Also inducted were Susanne LeClere, class of '76, a second lieutenant in the Air Force, and Kirk Simonian, class of '85, a Navy pilot recently recalled to active duty.

LeClere is the first woman to command the air wing for the Pentagon, in charge of oversight and Air Force readiness. Her 27-year military career has taken her many places, and the induction ceremony was just her second time back home. But said LeClere, sporting her cornflower blue Air Force uniform, she'll never forget the "great public education she

got and teachers who taught their lessons with great enthusiasm."

Kirk Simonian, George's son, wearing his crisp Navy dress blues, called his induction "humbling" in an interview prior to the ceremony, as special guests nibbled on cheese and crackers in the Hamilton Room. The Navy commander pilot, who is on leave from Southwest Airlines where he is a commercial pilot, said it was especially gratifying to be part of a group his father "laid the groundwork for." At the podium, Simonian battled his emotions as he again thanked his father, and his late mother, Lucy, who died of cancer a few years ago.

"No one gets to a place like this without a lot of help. It's an incredible honor," Kirk Simonian said. He thanked his wife, Jennifer, whom he called his "emotional backbone, and most importantly, the mother of my two beautiful daughters (Maggie, 5, and Ellie, 3)."

Then he moved an entire room, as he spoke of his parents. "George and Lucy Simonian were easily the most influential people in my life," he said, his voice cracking slightly. "They were Mr. and Mrs. CHS, but to us they were mom and dad." George Simonian wasn't the only one dabbing his eyes at that poignant moment. Handkerchiefs were abundant at every table during Kirk's remarks. He said "there isn't a day goes by that I don't reflect on what my dad or mother" taught him, or the foundation he received at CHS.

Kristina Shields Lutz, class of '87, probably provided the best quote of the night, lightening the mood of the more than 300 in attendance. Lutz, who has won praise for running programs for at-risk teens in Brockton, also founded a support group for mothers of triplets.

" I can't fly a plane. I can't toss a pizza, but if you put three babies up here I can nurse two and change one," said Lutz, prompting laughter across the room. Her 4-year-old triplets, Gunnar, Nikolas and Katarina, and 6-year-old daughter Annika, have kept her busy. Her years at CHS, including two perfect seasons with the varsity volleyball team as back-to-back state champions, has "taught me there are no shortcuts to success."

Dick DeFreitas, class of '57, proved on induction night that he belonged in the Hall of Fame by using the same talents and ingenuity that got him nominated. DeFreitas, an All-state band member as a sophomore at CHS, and who later went on to discover a major decoder design flaw for Raytheon, used his technical prowess to fix the DoubleTree's sound system which delayed the induction ceremony by what seemed like an eternity.

He said he was "proud, honored and humbled" to be receiving the recognition. He reminisced about growing up in Chelmsford in the 1950s, hanging out at Kydd's Ice Cream, and how "American-made meant something."

And to conclude his remarks, Mr Music, as he was known in high school, picked up his clarinet – his "first musical toy" -- and dedicated to all his classmates Benny Goodman's "Memories of You," the crisp, clear notes wafting through the auditorium like an easy summer day.

"Dear Dot and fellow '37 classmates. I am going to try one more time to say hi to all of you still remaining! I am hoping Dot can read this and maybe retype it for me. I went blind shortly after John died in 2003 and, though I have blurry vision that allows me to get around the house. I cannot read or write. This I am writing truly blind and cannot stop to reread or correct errors."

Other than blindness, deafness, and arthritis, I am doing quite well and can still enjoy life and family and friends. I still live in West Chelmsford in the house where I was born eighty-nine years ago. It's a twofamily house and daughter, Nancy, lives next door so I have great care from her. My two other daughters, Karen and Linda, also live in Chelmsford and they are a big help. I am thankful every day for my family and the love they bestow upon me."

I am looking forward to Spring and sitting out on my patio where I have planters with flowers to cheer me. I do love planting even though, without vision, it's hard. I pull a lot of plants because I think they are weeds. In the evening I watch some TV, though it's difficult. Most of all, I enjoy talking books supplied by the Commission for the Blind. That is a free and wonderful service for the blind."

Can you believe it's seventy-one years since we graduated from Chelmsford High School? We did have so many good times in those carefree years. I think of it often and wonder how many remain of the eighty-six who graduated that year. I'm in touch with very few classmates – only Dot Mackey, Shirley MacLean and Edgar George, and Charlie Boyd. Charlie calls now and then from California

and we have some good laughs. Shirley and Ed are up in Maine and currently are having some health problems."

I'm still in the house across the street from what was Quessy. Do drop by sometime. You'll find me out on my patio in good weather. How I'd like to see any of you who are able to hobble up my walk to say hi! Good health and happiness to you all!"

I felt blessed to hear from someone in our class as we are all drifting apart. The reason is obvious. Peter died in June of 2007 and I immediately moved into the Assisted Living facility on Chelmsford Street where I have a one-bedroom apartment. I sold our home on Dunstable Road that Pete built fifty-three years ago and also our condominium in Florida. I gave my Honda to a granddaughter. Now I live at Chelmsford Crossings, which is a very active community. I attend the exercise classes four times a week. I go to the hymn singing, to the Bible Reading class, to the knitting and crochet class, to the literature hour, and to some card games and word games. Entertainers come in almost weekly for our enjoyment. I also go out in the van to my doctor appointments, to the local stores, and to the movies. Then, you can usually find me at Bingo

three times a week. I go to the dining room three times a day for meals. If I awake too late for breakfast in the dining room then I go to the Country Kitchen for a continental breakfast. We have a beauty salon that is open twice a week, and there is a volunteer who comes in every week to give free manicures and hand massages. We have a Nintendo Wii with five games on it, including golf, bowling, baseball, tennis, and boxing. I have become quite proficient at bowling and golf. I beat one of the guys at bowling 202-160. I could very easily become addicted to these games. My son, Bob, and his wife, Barbara Kimball, and his daughter, Becky Mackey Morgan, visit sometimes and take me out. I still meet my retiree friends from Cabot Corporation once a month for lunch. When I'm in my apartment, there is always paper work, Sudoku and reading, my computer, and my 37" HDTV. Here, I feel comfortable, safe and secure. I heard form Charlton Boyd who is living in a similar facility in Dana Point, California, and who is also very accepting and content with his change in lifestyle.

As a resident of Chelmsford Crossings, on Sunday, February 3, we were entertained by the barbershop quartet, "Flying High." A member of the CHS class of 1998, Jane Moores, is one of the singers in this quartet and it was a joy to listen to their many songs. I talked to Jane when they concluded their program; she said she still lives in Chelmsford.

You are welcome to visit me. We could bowl, golf, play tennis or baseball, or box on the Wii, or just "hang out."

Suzanne Haven Ebel wrote that she and her husband Bill visited Maine a year ago and she remembered many fond memories of her prior times spent in Maine. She noted: "I was happy that Bill really, really enjoyed Maine, and we had a wonderful time for five days. My college roommate Carole

and her husband drove up to meet us for a full day of roaming the beach and eating in Perkins Cove. Art House had told us about Arrows, which we totally loved for dinner; and we stayed one night at the Cape Arundel Inn and ate at the White Barn Inn in Kennebunkport. I ate lobster rolls every single day!

In January we acquired a profile of Suzanne Haven Ebel from the Fuller Theological Seminary News, from which she is a distinguished Alumna. Although a bit long for Class Notes, I think it is too interesting to try to edit down, so....

"After some 30 years in ministry," says Suzanne Haven Ebel (MDiv '85), "I have begun to embrace Mary's simple obedient response to the Lord's announcement of her role "May it be unto me according to thy will." Though Ebel considers pastoral ministry her primary calling, she has served long enough to know that God's plans are not always predictable. As Ebel's ministry has also included university teaching, small group development, and leadership seminars, Fuller's mandate of "equipping men and women for the manifold ministries of Christ and his Church" is even more pertinent to her today than it was in the days of her attendance some two decades ago.

"Ebel has served as an associate pastor throughout her ministry, and in recent years, small group ministry has become a special niche. Her experience in churches in Albuquerque, New Mexico, is surprisingly eclectic, but the need for leadership training has remained consistent- from an established, mainline Presbyterian church, to a charismatic Presbyterian church, to a new church development in the Episcopal denomination, and in the evangelical Presbyterian church where she is currently in ministry. She has been training small groups leaders for years, in workshops, by modeling leadership in groups, and by mentoring leaders. "I have preached regularly throughout the years, but at this moment my primary responsibilities are teaching and small group development," she says.

"Ebel, in the ordained ministry since 1985, has "always striven to keep a balance between the intellect and the heart" in her teaching and in ministry one-on-one or in small groups. Not content to go with "the cultural flow of encouraging people to stay at the feel-good level of their Christian walk," as she puts it, she works to find ways to encounter God more deeply, "in order to experience his deeper companionship and blessing."

"What made Fuller such an important influence over the years of her ministry, she says, in theological integrity, "I didn't come to Fuller for spiritual renewal or development, though those things came to me through relationships with professors and student peers. I was there to learn how the Scriptures should be studied and taught with excellence." She fell in love with both Old Testament and New Testament studies and theology,

and with church history. She credits New Testament professor Donald Hagner's exegesis course taken twenty years ago as the basis of her discipline in preparing to preach or teach from the Scriptures.

Fuller's equipping of Ebel did not stop twenty years ago. Her current studies include revisiting books by Dietrich Bonhoeffer and Karl Barth that were first introduced at Fuller, and trying to grapple with the subjects that trouble people in daily life. Encouraging the giving of

oneself to Christ rather than being consumed with getting "is one of my hobby horses," she says, explaining that it is a struggle she has found personally challenging, and therefore infused with her own life learning. A high regard for Fuller's world-class faculty keeps her returning to Fuller to attend the annual President's Theological Lectures. "James Bradley's lectures, along with those of Richard Mouw, James Butler, and Marianne Meye Thompson, have instilled in me a love of church history," she says, so she considers it a testimony to Bradley and an indication of the institution's influence on her that she finds herself at the University of New Mexico

at the University of New Mexico as an adjunct professor. There, her classes on C. S Lewis' apologetics (her doctoral thesis subject at Trinity Episcopal Seminary in Ambridge, Pennsylvania) as well as the history of evangelicalism in the U. S.-- the first course of its kind at the university-have been very well received.

"Education at Fuller opened my eyes to the world of biblical studies, and I have never looked back. I have not strayed from the foundations, though I have grown and matured and deepened in my relationship with Christ." These foundations have shaped her perspective of a maturity defined on acceptance of people in a context of faithfulness to the truth of biblical teaching.







CHS Alumni Association Adds A New Scholarship


