

"Let's watch the sunrise," he said to me one summer afternoon.



"Huh?" was my response.

He then went on to tell me about the incredible view from atop the water tower off Turnpike Road, not far from the home I spent my early Chelmsford days growing up in. I'm sure I questioned it at the time, if not for the legality, then at least for the insanity behind it. But then I told myself, "he's a smart kid," and it wasn't like we were drinking or anything, so it must be a good idea, right? So the next morning, around 4 a.m., we shook off our seriously truncated slumber and stumbled down the big hill into the darkness. Back then, there were few homeland security threats, so the ladder to the top -where I'm guessing water department workers added chemicals or such was not fenced in, and well within our reach.

Bill gave me "10 fingers" to give me a leg up on and then leaped and pulled himself up.

It's a good thing it was pitch black, because I was a little scared of heights.

"Don't look down," he advised. (Good advice, till it was time to come down.)

After several minutes, we made it to the top, sat and waited. Then, sometime around 5 a.m., an enormous orange ball began to pierce the horizon over the Lowell Connector.

The sunrise was beautiful, and to that point in my life, one of the most incredible things I had ever seen.

A few years later when Bill was back home visiting me from RPI, he decided we should get up early and go for a run. I think the first "Rocky" movie had come out, and Bill, in his best Sly Stallone impression, tried to recreate the scene when Rocky begins



his training on the mean streets of Philadelphia. After again waking me up far too early, in the dark — this time in my mom's apartment on Princeton Boulevard in Lowell — I followed Bill to the kitchen where he proceeded to crack three or four raw eggs apiece into two glasses.

Gulp, belch, yuck!

I'm not sure how far we ran through the Lowell Highlands that chilly morning, but I do know I felt like crap. Maybe it was the thought of salmonella churning in my stomach, or the fact that I didn't really run back then, but this wasn't the type of extracurricular fun my friends at Northeastern prescribed to.

It's no small wonder his fraternity brothers at RPI dubbed him "Ozone."

While these particular escapades might more likely have gained Bill's acceptance into any number of mental-health facilities had they been made public years ago, there is no doubt that he also belongs in this school's Hall of Fame.

His classmates voted him Best All-Around Student. He graduated 21st in a class of 675 students, was a member of the state championship CHS Math Team, a member of both the French and National Honor Societies and a four-year member of the baseball team.

At one point or another throughout his baseball career — and I played with Bill in Senior Little League as well — he played every position. And he played most of them well. And while he wasn't the absolute fastest runner on the team, nobody got a better jump at stealing a base. His creed was that if you didn't have to dive back to the bag to avoid being picked off, you weren't getting a good enough lead.

That pretty much sums up the kid I went to school with and the man I still call friend: Committed, not afraid of living on the edge when he knows where he wants to go. Whether he gets there or not isn't as important as the journey itself, and the effort toward that destination. And he usually makes it.

Nothing rattles or fazes him, at least not that I can tell, even if he sometimes raises eyebrows with his exploits.

A favorite early memory of our friendship had Billy standing in my grandmother's kitchen, opening the refrigerator door and helping himself to a big gulp from a bottle of juice — no cup, of course. Grandma just scratched her head and smiled at me. I shrugged. I felt a lot better about it days later when I saw him do the same thing in the kitchen of his North Chelmsford home.

When we gather in Nashua in a couple of weeks to toast Bill and eight other deserving alumni, I will raise a glass to my good friend. It's entirely possible he might just grab the bottle instead, but either way, Bill Amirault will be just fine.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE * Terry McSheehy ('64)


I hope that everyone has had a great holiday season and that the New Year will be prosperous and healthy for us all.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT *

I can't believe that it's already January. Everyone told me my first year would fly by, but I didn't expect this quickly.

I remember when my wife and I had our first child (of three), all of our relatives and friends with children said the same thing – "The days go slow, but the years go so fast." Schools work very much the same way. Students enter as freshmen, wide-eyed, tentative, and curious, and then in a blink of an eye they're seniors, mature, brimming with confidence, and ready to take on the world. Our pride stems from the fact that the faculty and staff here at CHS contribute a great deal to help these students make that transition.

Over my time here, I continue to be impressed with the level of commitment the community, the students, the faculty and staff, and the Alumni Association have in Chelmsford High School. During the past 6 months I have completed more than 130 individual or small group interviews with various members of the CHS community to help me identify the areas requiring my attention, and those that make CHS the special place that it is. One piece that continues to come through is the notion of pride. Where most schools mention that they have pride, Chelmsford defines it. So much so, in fact, that PRIDE Awards (Perseverance, Respect, Integrity, Dedication, and Empathy) are given out to students for demonstrating these behaviors. These ceremonies remind me what CHS is really all about.



Here are a few other things that were proud of from the first semester.

• We had 18 students recognized for their performance on last year's PSAT as National Merit Commended Students, and we had one National Merit Semifinalist. Since these awards are typically given to the top 1-3% of the testing population, CHS had 5% of its senior class receive commendation.

• The Theatre Guild has performed three different plays this year – a student-faculty play, "All My Sons;" a student production, "Inherit the Wind;" and a play written by students for kids, "The Wonder Years." Each of the productions has been terrific, and we're looking forward the spring musical, "Phantom of the Opera."

• They say you can judge someone's true character when the chips are

down. If that's the case, CHS is an institution with impeccable character. In the wake of recent events in Newtown, CT, numerous faculty members and students came forward trying to find ways to help. As a result of the actions of a few, and the contributions of many, we were able to collect and donate \$1,500 to the Sandy Hook Fund. In addition we have also been able to raise significant contributions to the Santa Fund (\$2,700), and to Shriner's Hospital (\$2,400). Our National Honor Society is currently engaged in a fundraising drive to support the victims of the Woodcrest Condominium fire. CHS continues to be a caring community.

• The CHS Marching Band received new uniforms this year to outfit over 100 band members. In preparation for the Disney trip this year, they have performed Music from the Disney Show, Fantasmic. In addition to their routine performances, they had a terrific showing at Gillette Stadium this year during a UMASS football game.

• I know that Scott Moreau will have more specifics about fall athletic accomplishments, but there were two that really stuck out for me. Congratulations to the Boys Cross-Country team for being named the EMASS Division I Champion this year. Congratulations to the Girls Swimming + Diving team for finishing in 2nd place in the Commonwealth at the state meet.

• This year's National Honor Society Induction was held in December in the PAC. What a glorious ceremony. The members of the NHS board each spoke about the pillars of NHS – Leadership, Scholarship, Service, and Character. We welcomed over 115 new members into the organization. It was a night filled with tradition, ceremony, and recognition.

• We received formal notification earlier this week that the Committee on Public Secondary Schools (CPSS) of the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC) has voted to award Chelmsford High School continued accreditation in the Association. The Committee met at its October 28, 2012, meeting to review the decennial evaluation report prepared following the March 2012 visit to Chelmsford High School. The process of evaluation is extensive, often spanning three (+) years, that culminates in an evaluation performed by a 20 member visiting team. We were very pleased to earn our status.

• In keeping up with the tradition, our senior class (Class of 2013) won our annual Spirit Week competition. You may remember that spirit week culminates with our "pep rally" held in the gymnasium on the day before Thanksgiving. This was my first year being back in over 20 years, and I was amazed. As overwhelming as it can be to be surrounded by 1600 excited teenagers, it was an unbelievable event and testament to our school pride. 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

CHS ALUMNI PROFILE By Sandie Johnson Taylor ('69)

TOM PETERSON ('90)

Tom Peterson ('90) is another in a long list of talented CHS graduates who has returned to Chelmsford to share his expertise with its students, staff and community. In the last seventeen years, Chelmsford TeleMedia's Production Engineer Tom Peterson certainly has become a part of the culture not only of CHS, but also of Chelmsford Public Schools and the Chelmsford community. He has attended and helped to film every CHS graduation since 1987; every football game, both home and away, since 1996; almost every musical since he played in the pit for Kismet when he was a sophomore; and



every 24 Hour Relay since it began in 1997. He has also filmed many of the Hall of Fame evenings, made DVDs for the inductees, volunteered his time to help out with Chelmsford's Fourth of July Parades as well as with other town activities. Most importantly, Tom Peterson has made a difference in the lives of so many Chelmsford students.

In the words of former CHS Principal Al Thomas, "Tom is the man behind the scenes who probably doesn't get the recognition he deserves. Tom Peterson works hard at his role as a light, sound, and television production professional who makes CHS productions, and those by Chelmsford TeleMedia and outside groups, so very successful."

Tom's introduction to music, TV and theatre occurred during his years as a student in the Chelmsford Public Schools. "I always enjoyed music. My musical involvement started in third grade when I played the viola. In fourth grade I played the trombone and joined the band with Pete Sexauer. In the seventh and eighth grade, I continued to participate in the band with Evan Williams."

As a sophomore Tom played the trombone in the CHS band, playing in the pit at McCarthy for his first musical, Kismet, in 1988. That was his introduction to the theater. He was also involved in concert band and jazz band under the direction of John Leite, the orchestra with Ken Hanson, as well as the marching band. Today, in addition to his work with TV, Tom enjoys working with the CHS Theatre Department. Lauren Cochran, who has directed over 35 productions at CHS, says that, "Tom has been a consummate professional in both lighting and sound. If you come to a musical, it is Tom who is mixing the sound of all of the performers. He has helped the CHS Theatre Department in so many ways. For a guy who claims to be just a "TV guy," Tom is really a Thespian at heart."

"I loved music in high school but thought it would be fun to do a competitive sport as well, so I joined the swim team and began to swim for Coach Al Thomas." Peterson remembers Coach Thomas as a great coach who embraced and included all swimmers. Both Tom and Al recall the "other Tom Peterson ('87)" who was an All-Scholastic swimmer in high school and went on to be an All-American swimmer at Harvard. "Tom was often asked if he was the star swimmer. He would have to explain that he swam, but that he was not the star," Al recalls. He adds, "Tom worked hard and enjoyed being a member of the team."

And what about his introduction to TV? "When I got to the high school, a friend brought me to the TV studio for the first time. I can still remember my first impression of a scruffy but very friendly Matt Scott. Everything about it drew me in, and I have been hooked to this day."

When asked about teachers who made a difference for him academically, Tom responds without hesitation, "Aline Shimer and Peggy Theroux helped me to cope with my learning disability and to work hard to compensate for it. They taught me independence and always motivated me to strive to be better. He adds that Ms. Theroux still attends all of the CHS musicals."

"CHS provided me with a foundation for becoming self-sufficient and prepared me well for college. It provided more than a great education, it helped me to develop socially as well." The 1990 CHS graduate says, "I didn't realize how great the Chelmsford community and CHS really were until I started coming back during college to help Matt Scott in the TV studio."

In 1996 Peterson graduated from Southern Illinois University with a dual major: a BA in TV Production and a BS in Electronic Communications.

Hired by Chelmsford TeleMedia in February of 1996 when the public access TV station was based at CHS, Tom assumed the role both of advising the CHSTv Club, which he continues to advise along with Dan Silvia ('00) and of moving the public access studio to Parker in order that the CHS studio could be more available to the high school students.

Tom reflects on how far media technology has come since the fall of 1996, when under the charge of Anne O'Bryant, CHS students produced News Zone, a weekly news broadcast watched in the classrooms on black and white televisions. "The filming was done on big bulky camcorders and the footage had to be transferred from the VHS camera to the computer to be edited."

Reminiscing about some of his students back then, Tom says, "I would find Chris Meidell ('02) in the TV studio editing for News Zone before school, after school, and well into the evening." Chris Meidell currently works as an editor of promotional videos for MTV in New York. It seems apparent that Meidell represents just one of the many CHS graduates whose lives have been positively influenced by Tom Peterson.

In 1997 when Anne O'Bryant, who was Student Council advisor, organized the first 24 Hour Relay, it was Tom Peterson along with student leader, Nate Mackinnon ('00), who worked on site logistics including tent site lay out, and stage and sound system set up. They also broadcasted live the 24 Hour Relay to the community.

Today, Tom shares his expertise and creativity with the next generation of television professionals, who take his classes and participate in the CHSTv Club, as well as with students and teachers in classes across the curriculum at CHS.

In the spring semester, Tom offers Communication Media, a project based introduction to media course, in which students learn about such topics as mass media; news media; the impact of advertising on the media; visual effects from the fine arts angle, and lighting techniques. "Students produce a twenty five minute live radio program and promote a product in a commercial using only words and sound effects. They also produce a broadcast on a local channel and recreate a scene from a movie, learning about documentary filming techniques such as the use of color and camera angles," adds Peterson.

Media Internship, a course, which focuses on the football season, follows in the fall semester. Students are responsible for such things as filming the games, conducting and taping interviews of players and coaches, and editing and producing a final segment. "They create a multi-camera production, learning about running cameras, using sound, directing, interviewing, announcing, and designing graphics. When football season ends, we work on public service announcements and broadcasting." Recently students produced segments on such topics as texting while walking and the relationship between video games and a lack of sleep among CHS students.

Tom also shares his expertise helping classroom teachers and their students with projects such as digital storyboards as he has done in Cynthia Sandholm's freshman English classes as part of their unit on *To Kill A Mockingbird* and *The Pearl*. Sandholm is impressed not only with Tom's expertise but also with his patience and professionalism as he enthusiastically works with each student individually. English teacher Judy Sheehan shares, "I am hoping to use Tom's expertise again this year because the quality of the students' projects when we work with him and his programs is really quite professional!"

Tom, the Chelmsford TeleMedia Production Engineer and teacher, is also Tom, the husband to Melissa and dad to six-year old son Noah ('24). At home Tom can often be found helping Noah with his math homework. Recently, Tom hosted a tour of the Chelmsford TeleMedia studio at Parker Middle School for Noah, a first grader at South Row, and Noah's Cub Scout Troop, Pack 81. The field trip fulfilled part of the requirement for the scouts'Tiger Badges.

One of Noah's classmates asked Tom which events had been his favorites to film. "That would have to be the first round of the Democratic Debates held at Durgin Hall at UMASS Lowell in the fall of 2011 which was broadcast live and the multi-camera production we did at Gillette Stadium in 2007 when CHS won the Super Bowl."

Tom's involvement with CHS students doesn't end in June. During the past ten summers Tom and his students have brought the Lowell Spinners games to Chelmsford TeleMedia. It was at a Spinner's Game during the summer of 2011 that Tom and his students filmed the Human Cannonball. As reported on a Boston news blog, "In between the games of a double header between the Lowell Spinners and the Connecticut Tigers, 69-year-old daredevil, David "Cannonball" Smith was shot out of a cannon and over the right field fence for the unlikeliest of home runs." Tom and his students uploaded the footage to different news agencies such as ESPN Sports Center. "It made the Top Ten Videos that week! It was great exposure for us; it was funny and all very exciting."

As for the changes in television, Peterson replies, "Today people expect to watch their shows whenever and wherever they choose, not only on their TVs but also on their computers and their cell phones." He adds, "You can almost instantaneously watch a CHS game on YouTube from anywhere in the world."

Recently, Tom acquired 16mm footage of the 1955 Chelmsford 300th Anniversary Parade. That amazing piece of Chelmsford history can now be accessed (from any where in the world) on the CHS Alumni web site or on YouTube, thanks to Tom and CTM's archivist, Villu Tari. 

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR'S REPORT *

Athletic Director's Fall Report:

The 2012 fall season was very successful for the CHS Athletic Department. There were nearly 600 fall athletes participating in 10 athletic programs, fielding 21 teams and a student-training program. The overall fall varsity record was 79-40-13. All but one of the teams qualified for the postseason tournaments. The boys cross country team won the Eastern Mass Championship; this was the first time since the late 1980's. Our Field Hockey Team was MVC Champions for the first time in almost 10 years. The girls swim team was MVC runner-ups and also finished 2nd in the state meet at Harvard University. Individually we had 18 athletes named to their respective All Conference teams and 42 named to All Star teams.

Boys/Girls Cross Country: Both

Cross Country teams had very successful seasons. The boy's team finished second in the MVC, losing only one meet all season. They ran their best at the end of the season as they captured the EMass Title for the first time in over 20 years. The girl's team also finished second in the MVC and 3rd in the EMass Championships. Individually Quinn Cooney, Dan Nolan and Alli Wood were named to the MVC All Conference Team.

Golf: The golf team played well this season but didn't qualify for the state tournament for the first time in



many years. They did however show much improvement throughout the season with a young team; we are expecting big things in the future. Eddie Lou had a terrific post season as an individual as he went to the sectional tournament and finished high enough to qualify for the state tournament. Eddie was also named to the MVC All Conference Team.

Field Hockey: The Field Hockey team had another great season finishing with a 17-2-1 record and winning the MVC Title. In the tournament, the Lady Lions beat Lowell and Andover and eventually lost in the North Semi-Finals to Weston. The team had some great individuals as well; Annie Villare (League MVP), Rachel Bossi, Brittany Oliver and Kaleigh Hoffman were all named to the MVC All Conference Team. Coach Maura Devaney was named MVC Coach of the Year as well.

Football: The football team had another winning season as they

finished with a 6-5 record. They finished the year in winning fashion by beating archrival Billerica on Thanksgiving Day. The team started the season strong winning its first 4 games but hit a rough patch along the way due to some key injuries. The Lions All Conference selections were Jeff D'Auria and Matt Rabbitto.

Boys Soccer: The soccer team had another strong season finishing with a 9-6-4 record and qualifying for another state tournament. The team won its first tournament game in over 10 years with a win over Cambridge Ridge and Latin. Unfortunately the season came to an end losing to the #1 Seed Masconomet Regional in the second round. The Lions Steve McLeod and Casey Hamill were all named to the MVC All Conference Team.

Girls Soccer: The girls had another strong season under 2nd year coach Anne Marinaro finishing with an 8-6-5 record. The team qualified for the tournament for the 2nd year in a row and beat Haverhill in the first round before bowing out to Lincoln-Sudbury in OT penalty kicks. The Lady Lions Brianna Raymond (Goal Keeper of the Year) and Kayla Loycano were named to the MVC All Conference Team.

Girls Swimming: The girls swim and dive team had another strong season finishing with a 12-1-1 record and 2nd in the MVC. The end of the season

really excelled, the girls finished 2nd in the State Championships at Harvard University. The girls 200 Freestyle Relay Team of Caitlin Sheridan, Jenny Day, Kat Su and Julia Sementelli were Div 1. State Champions. Caitlin was also the individual state champion in the 100 Freestyle and the 200 yd. medley. Jenny Day was the state champion in the 500 yd. freestyle. Team members Jenny Day, Caitlin Sheridan and Kat Su were all voted to the MVC All Conference Team as well.

Girls Volleyball: The girl's volleyball team finished the season with a 10-10 record and once again qualified for the state tournament. In the first round of the tournament the team lost to top seeded North Andover in a great game. The Lady Lions Lauren Silverman was named to MVC All Conference Team.

Two weeks before Christmas, I received a phone call from a WWII friend named Melba Nelson whom I hadn't seen for 67 years, since the end of the war. The war in the European Theater had just come to an end and our soldier husbands were ordered to the South Pacific Theater. Peter was Crew Chief of B-25's and A-26's in the Army Air Corps and this meant that the soldiers' families had to leave the area. Melba and I parted at a train station in the summer of 1945 (after living on \$300/month for two years), Melba and her baby girl to Kansas and me with my son Bob to MA, never to see them again, although we have kept contact these 67 years. Our babies had been born at the Army Air Base in Columbia, SC, my Bob ('63) was born on Dec. 17, 1944. 3. CLASSMATE SNAPSHOTS: GEORGE LINTON

When I began to put George's snapshot together, I soon realized he has lived two lives: one as a father and grandfather living and working locally; the second is as a remarried husband not only with a totally different focus, but in a different country!

In his first life George obtained his degree in electronic engineering from the University of Massachusetts at Lowell. He married his first wife, Sandra, during his university years, and also joined the US Naval Reserve, serving for 8 years. The Lintons lived in Nashua, NH and had three children: 2 boys (William, Jeffrey) and a girl (Cynthia). Altogether there are 8 grandchildren. George and Sandra divorced after raising their family.

George worked for the former Sanders Associates, in Nashua, his only employer, retiring in 1998 after 42 years, two-thirds of those years as a Program Manager. His position required extensive travel throughout North America and many countries in Europe and Asia.

George's passion is fishing. He fished when and wherever he could, as there was always a fly rod and reel in his luggage. To name some: he has fished Virginia, Pennsylvania, New York, Maine, New Hampshire, Quebec, Newfoundland, Labrador, New Brunswick, Alaska, British Columbia and Oregon. He primarily fishes for Atlantic salmon as well as varied species of trout. There were also a few trips for billfish in Venezuela, until the political situation in that country prohibited travel there.

In his second life, George, in the spring, headed north into Canada with his best friend to fish for Atlantic salmon. Near the end of his trip he was invited to join the fishing club at the camp. The following year he and his friend went to Canada for 2 full weeks of fishing and he was invited to join the summer / fall fishing as well, and it became George's passion.

Obviously this all resulted into multiple trips annually, and along the way George developed a close relationship with Canadians, especially a lady, Jo-Anne, who was the office manager for the Miramichi Salmon Association located in Fredericton, New Brunswick, Canada. First there was coffee break together at a local restaurant that turned into a light lunch for 3 hours with permission to call her that evening. The next weekend it was meeting for brunch, then there was the next, and the next and the next, resulting in his proposing on Valentine's Day in 2003 and a wedding on October 10th that same year!

After the wedding, George moved into Jo-Anne's home and they together modernized it to current

standards. Neither expected to be remarried, but they tell me that they are enjoying a wonderful life in Fredericton, NB, enjoying their life to the fullest. And, as the story goes, they lived happily ever after!

BEVERLY (LYDON) PEYSER A promotional piece for Fisher College features Bev and calls her a "Whirling Dervish." When you are through with this classmate snapshot, you are going to be exhausted just reading about her life - not living it.

At 19, fresh out of Fisher Junior College (to which she received a scholarship) Bev was hired by Ann W. Kelly, a famous aviatrix, with major responsibilities to draft the monthly Northeast Airlines Company Newsletter, as well as operate the office as a "Girl Friday" while Ms. Kelly lobbied in Washington, D.C. At 20, heeding the call of President Eisenhower for young people to learn a foreign language and culture, Bev applied to the State Department and was accepted onto the Foreign Service Staff, with her first assignment to report to Ankara, Turkey, a country

and culture she fell in love with and has returned to twice, 50 and 55 years later.

After 2 1/2 years in Turkey, where she mastered the language primarily thanks to a local senior who served as her language mentor. The U.S. mission, under the auspices of the Marshall Plan, was to help the Turkish citizens rebuild their country's infrastructure from the devastation of WW II. After the assignment, Bev found herself in Washington, D.C. planning to return to Turkey, but instead took a job offer with A.I.D. (The Agency for International Development) and moved into Georgetown, describing this time, during the Kennedy years, as a very exciting and magical time to live and work around Washington.

It was at A.I.D. that she met her future husband, Seymour Peyser, a lawyer with a New York law firm. The marriage provided Bev a readymade family: two girls (Libby and Andrea) and a young son, Michael. Bev said there were lots of adjustments, but that her marriage provided her with a beautiful family life including seven grandchildren, the youngest today a student at Stamford. Her husband, an Army veteran, served on Justice Jackson's staff at the Nuremberg Trials. In 1962, President Kennedy appointed him Assistant Administrator for A.I.D., with a rank of Assistant Secretary of State. They were married in 1968 and moved to New York City where she finished her undergraduate degree at Hunter College in Political Science and Urban Affairs followed by her Master's at Hunter (a part of the City of New York University) in Urban Planning, graduating in 1978. For the Master's she did many projects with the Lenox Hill Neighborhood Association: (1) an experimental playground based on a U.K. model using only childrencreated objects,(2) an outreach program matching teens and seniors, which is still running today, (3) the renovation, with community involvement, and saving of a Carnegie Library, (4) the renovation of a school cafeteria serving 2000 students, and (5) work on zoning and land use issues which led to providing open space plazas in New York City by law. Bev's many efforts led to her being appointed by the Mayor of New York City to serve for 4 years on Community Board 8 which monitor's Manhattan's Museum Mile beginning at Central Park.

While living in New York, Bev set up a private independent contracting company - Urban Design Works - which brought tennis to New York City Schools and included lobbying before the NYC Council, working with Borough Presidents and City Council people, school principals, and parents.

In semi-retirement, the Peysers moved to Old Greenwich, CT and retained an island get-away cottage on an island on a lake in Northern New Jersey, where the only access is by rowboat (no motorboats allowed). In Old Greenwich, Bev and Sy (who suffered with macular degeneration) became active members of the Lions Club, and were instrumental in the establishment of a Low Vision Center in Greenwich, which today is still funded and operated by the Lions.

Bev and Sy had friends who wintered in Sarasota, FL and they started going there a few weeks in the winter and those turned into months, leading to purchase of a house in beautiful Siesta Key (a section of Sarasota) where they moved permanently and both learned quickly to love the Florida lifestyle.

After Sy passed, Bev made a conscious decision to support and

participate in the arts. The interaction of these disciplines keeps her busy in Sarasota: she has been playing cello in an orchestra for 7 years; co-leads an up to 20 person 8 week winter Great Decisions Group; participates at the Academy of Life-Long Learning offering courses in art, music and literature; paints with a watercolor collegial group, and belongs to a writing group which meets once a month most of the year. This winter she is actively involved in selecting films for the women's film festival produced by U.N. Women.

Bev spends the months of August and September (although this year she will stay until early October as she will be at the Class of 1953 reunion) in the Berkshires at Tanglewood with its music, museums and the Shakespeare Theater. She often drives to Maine and sails for a week on a schooner, does some painting, travels down to Massachusetts to visit favorite childhood places on Cape Ann, and completes the summer by visiting family and friends in New York, Connecticut and New Jersey.

Bev is the caretaker of a slice of Florida - Ruth and I visited her there where a long boardwalk off the pool leads to a secluded estuary teeming with Florida plants and indigenous wildlife. At her home, we felt transformed into another time while we ate homemade strudel and drank Persian/African coffee (which is delicious by the way) among the orchids Bev grows in her home and exchanged stories about our life's experiences. It was a very special afternoon.

(P.S. Before leaving I got a check from Bev for the \$10.00 annual dues fee for renewal of her membership in the CHS Alumni Association. That's one down, only 30 class members to go!) -*Roy* Eleanor Leach sent us sad news that she lost her son at age 45 on June 15, 2012. We send our condolences. She also has two daughters seven grandchildren (6 boys and one girl) ranging in age from 5 to 32.





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
