Stephen Murray relishing his first days as CHS' new leader

CHELMSFORD — Only four days into his first year as Chelmsford High School's new principal and Stephen Murray was grinning from ear to ear as he was led out to the Lion statue on the school's scorched front lawn for a brief photo shoot in 93-degree heat.

"It's the smoothest opening I've had in 17 years as an administrator," said Murray, 45, a 1988 CHS alum who spent the past nine years in Andover, working as assistant principal at the Andover West Middle School, then as its principal before being named interim Andover High principal last December.

He left for Andover in 2005 after seven years as assistant principal at McCarthy Middle School in Chelmsford, where he taught seventh-grade social studies for three years.

Murray said the CHS support staff made scheduling and his transition seamless. And the students and teachers couldn't have been more welcoming.

"What a warm greeting," he said.

He was also smiling, admittedly because he had come home to his "dream job."

The Chelmsford resident's heart has always been with his hometown — OK, he's a blow-in; he's only lived here since age 2 — though he has nothing but praise for his former colleagues in Andover. He and his wife, Pam, a 1985 CHS grad, are raising their children, Andrew, 8, and McKenna, 20 months at this writing, in town. Pam, in fact, teaches at McCarthy.

Murray had applied for the top CHS spot a few years earlier and was a finalist along with 1990 CHS grad Charlie Caliri. Caliri won the job and Murray stayed put.

He was disappointed, but Murray said "it was completely understandable," because Caliri had experience as a high school principal. "I hire people based on their experience, too."

When Caliri announced last winter he would be leaving CHS after only three years to take the helm at Marlboro High, many people in the school system and community encouraged Murray to reapply. At the time, Murray had been just named Andover High's permanent principal for the fall 2015.

But his friends in Chelmsford weren't giving up.

CHS Hawthorne House Dean Josh Blagg was "on my case all the way through," Murray said.

As it turns out, Murray and the administration in Andover couldn't agree to terms. He said they wanted to severely restrict when he could take vacation and personal time, something he wasn't willing to give up with a young family.

"We thought we had missed the opportunity" to hire Murray, recalled School Committee Chairman Al Thomas, adding his hiring was somewhat unconventional, but because it was late in the year and "we knew the quality of candidate," the board urged the superintendent to hire Murray. "He was obviously a candidate we wanted to get in," said Thomas.

So in the spring, as the School Committee was negotiating Superintendent Frank Tiano's departure after a tumultuous year which saw massive budget cuts, mismanaged accounts and controversial layoffs, Murray applied and was quickly named CHS principal by Tiano.

Why would he want to come back to a school system that largely resembled a hornet's nest for the past year?

"I like fixing problems and building bridges," Murray said. "Every school has its issues."

He said even in Andover, a more affluent community than Chelmsford, the system has had its share of turnover and layoffs.

"I wanted to get back to my passion. I love Chelmsford," he said.

That passion extends far beyond the classrooms and halls of his school. In addition to a host of education-

related committees, Murray has been an assistant girls basketball coach at CHS, has been on the Chelmsford Youth Basketball League board of directors for more than 20 years, was a founder and board member for the 24-Hour Relay, and is a member of the Town of Chelmsford Scholarship Committee, to name a few.

His efforts haven't gone unnoticed. He was inducted into the CHS Alumni Association's Hall of Fame two years ago.

"I get my volunteerism from my mom," Murray said, noting that she wore many hats as he grew up, including rape crisis counselor, translator for Lowell General Hospital, Cub Scout volunteer and a recess aide at McCarthy.

His father, a lifelong W.R. Grace employee, a company that has faced its share of environmental criticism over the years, "has always stood for honesty and integrity," Murray said.

Those who have welcomed him home say that's what Murray brings to CHS.

"Because of his positive outlook on everything, people were excited about him coming back," said Thomas. "There had been some discontent within the faculty in the past few years. It's a totally different atmosphere. Everyone is excited about working with him."

Perhaps none more than Blagg.

"We grew up together," said Blagg, referring to his first years as a teacher at McCarthy and Murray's as an administrator.

"Just to watch his rapport with kids and teachers. He's a transformative

leader," said Blagg. "He's able to push teachers to grow, change, and he got the most out of kids. He's a real advocate for students."

Blagg pushed Murray to apply for the job several years ago as well.

"I've been a big champion for a while because I've seen him in action," said Blagg. "It's a great atmosphere in the building. He's got a great wit, sense of humor. And he's here for the right reasons."

Murray always envisioned himself becoming an administrative leader at some point, but he just happened to do it at age 28.

It's a job not unlike that of parent, though he said being the latter is tougher, since there's so much you can't control, like if "someone calls him (his son) a name. It's tough to see your child upset and try to be impartial."

That empathy extends to the schoolyard, as well, for Murray.

"You feel bad when you see a student make a poor choice. You want to fix it for him but you've got to walk him through it instead," Murray said. "You take it personally when one of your (students) gets in trouble."

As a school system, Chelmsford needs to do more to help kids in the middle, as well as those who excel or have IEPs (individualized education plans), he said.

Murray said the community also needs to do more to take care of its young adults when they leave the school system, pointing to the growing opiate crisis as one example.

Other goals Murray has as he embarks on this new journey include making sure school leaders learn from past mistakes but don't dwell on them. He also stressed "building bridges of communication before issues become problems."

And 10 years from now, will it be Superintendent Murray starting a new chapter and fixing problems on a wider scale?

For now, there are no such plans, he said.

"I plan to stay here as long as I can," Murray said.

And the longtime basketball coach also noted other perks of coming home to Chelmsford.

Said Murray, "I'm just excited now I can openly root for Chelmsford."

I cannot say enough about the warm welcome that the staff, students, parents, and the community gave me.

I am really enjoying my transition back to Chelmsford. Now that I have completed my first full month with the students, there is so much to update you about and inform you about regarding student events and changes at CHS.

The new school year got off to a fantastic start. In July, the band and orchestra ventured to Washington D.C. to play in the 4th of July parade and at the war memorials. It was a VERY hot and humid weekend but from all reports, they sounded fantastic. Recently the band was asked to perform our national anthem and the Canadian national anthem at a Red Sox game.

August brought the Chelmsford Public Schools great press with an article in Newsweek. Newsweek listed the top 500 high schools in the country in terms of getting students ready for college. CHS was one of the top 500 schools in the COUNTRY! This is a true credit

to the staff and administration of the high school. Equally, it is a wonderful commentary on the hard work from the elementary and middle school staffs. I cannot think of a better place to work than in a district that has a great reputation for academic excellence while creating a caring and nurturing atmosphere for students.

Chelmsford High School's Theater Guild is busy making theater dreams come true. For the past thirty years, Chelmsford High School has had a very active Theater Guild. It has seen dedicated advisors, students and even more dedicated fans. Students have gone on to star on Broadway, off-Broadway, in film and television as well as working in the technical aspects of theater. One alumnus worked for Cirque du Soleil in Vegas, two more are currently on the National Tour of Cinderella and others have recently worked in Summer stock theater! However, it is because of the amazing theatrical supporters and the members of Chelmsford's community that the Theater Guild has grown and prospered.

For the past sixteen years, the Theater Guild has been under the guidance of Mrs. Lauren Cochran. Under her initial leadership, students in the theater guild built a closet in the old lecture hall at the high school. Seven years ago, The Theater Guild was once more running out of storage space. Costumes and props were overflowing.

At a Theater Guild board meeting, a proposal of building a separate storage shed was discussed. All agreed it was a great plan, but

could it happen? First permission and approval from the School Committee was received to build a storage shed on the property behind the new Performing Arts Center. Charles Cochran from Cornerstone Architects, agreed to work on plans pro bono. The number \$60,000 was decided as a target to build this "storage shed."

New fundraisers evolved: CHS' Next Top Teacher brought in \$5,000 the first year it was performed. Since then, two additional Next Top Teachers have been successfully produced, rotating every 3 years! Students in the Theater Guild wrote and performed in a video sponsored by the television show, Glee, earning them a prize of \$10,000. After five years of fundraisers that included selling commemorative bricks, murder mysteries, dog tags, bumper stickers, various performances – The Theater Guild raised the necessary funds and the shed was built! It is not just a "shed" but includes a second story for costumes and props and a first floor for sets!

Pleased with the result, the Theater Guild looked at the old closet and thought, why not turn this into a "Black Box Theater?" The lecture hall was old and worn out with ripped red carpets and steps that impeded the use of this space for dance. The Guild sprung into action and they completed Phase One of the renovation of the Black Box Theater!

Phase One included gutting the old lecture hall, replacing the floor, lowering a door frame and painting everything black. A Black Box Theater is painted black so light

can focus on where the performances take place! Many high schools have converted classrooms into black box theaters and CHS is excited that it has already used the space for performances! Last year, CHS performed a murder mystery in the fall and a Holiday recital. The Black Box is used daily for auditions, rehearsals and performances.

Phase One is now complete and the Theater Guild hoped to finish phase two this past summer – but unfortunately, funds are running lower than hoped. Phase two is to put in a new ceiling tiles and change the house lights so they are on a dimmer, and then add a grid to place theater lights with a dimmer board so it can truly be used as a mini-theater.

Phase three is to add a wall of mirrors, curtains to cover them and the white boards, and to add a portable stage.

Slowly but surely, the Theater Guild knows it will raise much-needed funds. This year, the students are planning on a once a month “Night Sounds” of music, featuring students singing and performing in a coffee house-style atmosphere.

Hopefully, next summer will bring to fruition phase two of The Black Box Theater! When this project is completed what will they do next?

SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS NIGHT

Likewise, Fiona Busser, Rachel Moore, and Nicole Wrobel agreed that it was "generous of the alumni association" and it was "nice to be recognized for our work."

Each was awarded with two scholarships from the alumni association. Come fall, Moore will be attending Brandeis focusing on English and business. Busser will be attending Holy Cross for biology, while Wrobel will be enrolled in Stonehill for graphic design and business.

Grace Gerhardt, who will be attending WPI for aerospace engineering, was also awarded two scholarships. She said that it was "pretty cool" to be the "first female" to be awarded one of the "scholarships specific for football."

It was as if "people have been watching," said Evan Smith, and it was nice to have "recognition." Smith, who enrolled at Yale University to study mechanical engineering, was awarded three scholarships that night.

These six highlighted alumni were only a few of the jovial and honored crowd of recipients gathered at awards night. With their families in tow, the recipients were present to witness the "finest example of the impact of alumni" as stated by McSheehy.

In an anecdote, Principal Charlie Caliri said that "there's no such thing as a free lunch" in life, and that in essence showed that the recipients had worked hard for their scholarship and in reference to any help, "every bit counts."

This awards night followed in tradition to prior awards night with the atmosphere filled with gratitude and generosity. As the night drew to a close, it was apparent that the recipients would continue to lead bright futures in accordance to Caliri's quote that each alumni's "greatest asset" was after all, and well recognized, themselves.

With this awards night, the link between recent and past alumni was forged and solidified, and the continuous cycle of generosity turned one more revolution. ♦

The 2014/15 school year was another extremely successful year for our athletic teams.

The department offered 31 varsity sports and 48 sub-varsity sports in which 1400 student athletes participated, the overall varsity record was 250-174-13. Three of our teams won league championships, 28 out of 31 teams qualified for the post season and three teams won Division 1 North Sectional Titles; Wrestling, Boys Volleyball and Baseball.

Individually we had 10 Boston Globe/Herald All Scholastic selections, 4 individual state champions, 6 league players of the year, 62 All-Conference Selections, 74 All-Star selections and 5 of our coaches were recognized as coaches of the year.

In Boys Cross-Country, Quinn Cooney became the first student in CHS history to win the MVC, MIAA Divisional and All State Meets all in the same season.




BRUCE RICH



It was pretty much a foregone conclusion, Bruce Rich's induction into the Massachusetts chapter of the National Wrestling Hall of Fame. Are there any halls of fame he's not a member of?

Rich, a 1973 Chelmsford High graduate and 2001 inductee into the CHS Alumni Association's Hall of Fame, was also already inducted into the state and New England wrestling halls of fame.

He was nominated for this latest honor by longtime state wrestling official Dennis Mulvihill, who serves on the state board.

Rich, Chelmsford High's varsity wrestling coach for 37 years, will be enshrined on Saturday, Nov. 14, at a banquet at the Framingham Sheraton Hotel at 7:30 p.m. for his lifetime of service to the sport.

"It's quite an honor to be recognized at the national level," said Rich. "I guess this is the last stop.

"If you spend enough time surrounded by good people, good things happen," Rich said of the honor. "I've had great kids, great families... I've met a lot of great people along the way," he added, giving a special nod to his mentor and longtime wrestling coach Randy Whitehead and Lowell High coaching legend George Bossi.

Rich taught in Brookline for a year after graduating from Boston University in 1977, and was freshman coach and then an assistant under Whitehead when he came to Chelmsford a year later until Whitehead's retirement in the late '70s.

"He was an excellent wrestler... took third in the state," recalled Whitehead. "He was a very good captain."

The two also taught physical education together for a number of years, and Whitehead's admiration

for Rich's approach with students and athletes only grew.

"I always admired his calmness," said Whitehead. "He had a nice calm manner about him that I never had. I wish I did. The kids liked him a lot and obviously he's done a great job, and not just in wrestling."

Rich has amassed seven state wrestling titles and one New England title.

He is also one of a very few to have more than 1,000 victories coaching over three sports: wrestling, football and softball.

"Not many people can say that," said Whitehead, noting that Rich has amassed more than 500 alone in wrestling.

Bossi, Rich's longtime, friendly foe, agreed.

"Anybody that can win state championships in three different sports has got something going," said Bossi. "I've known him a long time. He's a great coach. He's the exact opposite of me. He doesn't try to pull the triggers to motivate where I just scream and intimidate.

"We all have our different personalities... He's got the personality of trial lawyer -- quiet voice, but persistent and exact," said Bossi.

Bossi said the Merrimack Valley Conference is about the toughest around for wrestling, and whoever wins out -- and it's often Chelmsford or Lowell -- stands a shot at a state title.

"We're friends, but when it's time to play, we play," said Bossi. "We

compete and we compete with vigor. We go against the best and we're not afraid to lose."

Losses have been rare for Rich and CHS, but Chelmsford High Athletic Director Scott Moreau said the victories go far beyond what happens on the mat.

"I have known Bruce for 28 years now and have witnessed his great contributions to the sport of wrestling on many levels. I have had the honor of being coached by him as a student, coaching with him as an assistant and working with him as a colleague," said Moreau. "He has touched thousands of lives. The record for CHS wrestling under his direction is astonishing, winning multiple state championships as well as a New England Championship."

Moreau added that Rich's wrestlers have won numerous individual state and New England Championships as well.

"With his knowledge and expertise he has been able to offer a great service to wrestling, not only in Chelmsford but also in the state of Massachusetts," said Moreau.

That path of service was practically mandated by his older brothers.

Rich was a basketball player in a church league, and there was no youth wrestling program at the time. And so when his older brother Jim won a state wrestling championship for CHS as a junior, and then his brother Bill was a year ahead of him on the team, "it was looking like I wasn't going to have any choice," he said. "But I'm glad I did."

Rich said wrestling is "probably the most demanding (sport), at least in high school. You use every muscle in your body."

"It's a great discipline," he added. "You meet challenges head to head. But it's a team sport and you need that to get to the next level.

"You have to have a good work ethic to excel in the sport and I think it carries over into other things you do in your life later on," he said.





EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

ANNUAL MEETING SEPTEMBER 16, 2015

The Lion's Pride continues to be a great publication. Our first issue was printed in the Fall of 1989, so we are now in our 26th year. We want to thank Kris Pisarik, our Editor-in-Chief; Nancy Williams, our Class News Editor; Sandie Taylor for her role in both special assignments and Alumni Profiles; and Debbie Haywood for her Student Profiles. We also extend our gratitude to Christy Whittlesey, for her all-inclusive Fine & Performing Arts report; Scott Moreau for the complete report of all things athletic; Mary St. Hilaire, for her efforts as Advertising Manager, and Lynne McSheehy and her proofreading team. Nancy Hughes' recording of "In Memoriams," and Jeff Gallant's work as Class Agent Liaison are greatly appreciated, as well. We want to give special recognition to Dan Looney and his company for their past role in preparing the Lion's Pride for the Post Office and to Paul Favreau and the Gilet Brothers for their design and printing expertise in making the publication dynamite-looking!

One of the CHSAA's truly amazing accomplishments is the Endowment Fund, which is, at this time, valued at over \$1,400,000 – and growing – thanks to alumni and friends who give back to CHS, so that future alumni can receive some financial help as they pursue college careers. More designated scholarships are being added to the Endowment Fund every year. As of this moment we have 110, with promises of more to come.

Our 17th annual Scholarship Awards Night was held last May 27th, and was again a huge success. Attending were over 200 recipients, parents, scholarship donors, high school staff, the Superintendent of Schools, School Committee members, the Town Manager, Selectmen, and Association members. The Performing Arts Center, newly named for CHSAA Hall of Fame member and recently retired music teacher Carl Rondina, is the perfect venue for a great night. We awarded \$47,390 in 132 scholarships to CHS Seniors and Alumni who are presently in college. A Wilmington High School senior also received a \$150 award, as is the case every year, thanks to the Carl Olsson scholarship, which is shared with a CHS senior, as well. Since 1993 we have given away a total of over \$650,000 in 1275 scholarships to CHS seniors and alumni, and \$4000 to 18 Wilmington High School seniors.

We need to give special thanks to a number of people. Joan Murphy and Carol Pilat lead the Scholarship Committee, which does the labor-intensive work of determining the recipients of the scholarships. Bob Pariseau put in a huge amount of work in computerizing the entire scholarship application process, which has saved much time and paper and has made the selection process much more efficient. Nancy Hughes and the Awards Night Committee provide the structure for the evening itself, and it continues to move smoothly from the first 'housekeeping' announcement of the master of ceremonies to the munching of the last cookie and pieces of cheese. Speaking of the Master of Ceremonies, Terry

McSheehy has done a masterful job for years and has worked hard to make sure that every recipient and donor gets their moment in the spotlight, while not wasting one precious moment in the very busy lives of the participants. The next Awards Night will be held on May 24, 2016 in the PAC and you are all welcome – encouraged! – to attend.

The 25th Anniversary Hall of Fame induction was held this past March, and nine more great people were inducted. We had close to 385 guests, our biggest crowd yet! If you haven't been to one yet, you're missing something great! The 26th Hall of Fame induction will be held on March 19, 2016, at the Radisson in Nashua.

Special thanks to the Hall of Fame Committee, co-chaired by Bruce McMaster and Howie Neild, and to Bob Pariseau, who now chairs the small Nominating Committee.

Once again our Association had a successful Fourth of July Booth, this year, as last, under the guidance of Jeff Gallant. The volunteers signed up 3 new members, had 9 former members rejoin, and had 4 members pay their dues. Product sales brought in \$178! Thanks to Jeff and everyone who volunteered to help out on the 3rd and the 4th. The booth facilitated lots of mini-reunions, fun and Visibility!

Membership is the lifeline of the Association. As of September 1, the CHSAA has over 1300 active, dues-paying members. Over 500 of that number are Life Members. On the negative side, we lose about a dozen

members every quarter due to non-payment of dues. If we didn't have this loss, our membership would be well over 4500. Our dues are collected by Mike Desmarais, and he has been a big help!

Again we want to thank Bob Logan for handling all of our tax matters.

The Alumni Authors' Corner was established a number of years ago and continues to grow. Copies of the works of published Alumni are on display in a case and are available in the Learning Commons at CHS. There are 118 works on display! The last wall in the corner was opened this past spring in order to accommodate the newest additions. Many thanks to Mark Maybury for all of his efforts in collecting the works and preparing them for display. You should definitely make an effort to see the Authors' Corner.

The CHSAA website: www.chsalumni.org is our immediate link to the outside world, thanks to Jessica Del Llano. It features who we are, a calendar of events, Endowment Fund information, Scholarship Information, and Scholarship Winners. There is also important information about the Hall of Fame: both how to nominate new members and a list of all who have been inducted in the past. The web site also gives information on how to join the CHSAA, as well as updates on current plans for Class Reunions, and the Capital Campaign.

Three years ago we added two students as non-voting members of the Board of Directors. Thanks to Joey Penn '15 and Claire Markey '16 for their participation this past year. The objective behind this action was to increase our knowledge of the high school activities from the students' perspective and for the students

to become more aware of what an alumni association is all about. This initiative continues to be very successful!

The objective of the Project Share initiative is to place a member of the Association in the Career Center, where this individual will work as a counselor with the student body in the areas of career and college explorations, career mentoring and shadowing, work study, etc. This counselor would use the Alumni in the area as the resource pool. This project is under the direction of George Dixon and Dennis Hunt and has been put on hold until funding for it has been established.

The Capital Campaign is now off the back burner. A Quo Vadis committee was formed two years ago with Tom Curran as Chairman. The major objectives of this committee are as follows:

1. Conduct a public relations program within the community as to who and what the CHSAA is all about.
2. Conduct fund-raising activities
3. Raise the funds which will be invested in an Endowment Fund for future salaries for an Executive Director and an Administrative Assistant.
4. This will give the Association some stability and a program for future development.

The Foundation Committee held two fund-raisers this past spring. Working in partnership with the CHS Boosters Club, they raised \$4305 by sponsoring a road race. The golf tournament they sponsored raised \$7434. These will both be annual events, and in time will grow in size and funds. Thanks to Tom Curran and his Committee!



And finally, I want to thank the Board of Directors – and ALL Committee members – who have worked hard this past year to make this organization the huge success it is today.

Public high school Alumni Associations are a rare species. We are in our 27th year of doing good things for CHS and its alumni. However, as I have said in the past, and will continue to say, people and organizations can be like trees. The rise to prominence is exhilarating, but anything that puts up shoots faster than it puts down roots is fragile and in danger of breaking, falling or dying. The Quo Vadis Campaign is crucial if we are to endure as a viable organization.

- Congestive heart failure

- Diabetes (type 2)
- And even a few other personal items I don't wish to make public here.

I did lose 60 pounds going from a 42-inch waist to a 36 and with my left hand ring finger getting smaller, I lost my wedding band in August at my stepson's Orleans home on Cape Cod. Franklin Warren passes.

There were three people in our class who our yearbook pinpointed as destined to be farmers - Manny Avila, John Gravelle, and Franklin Warren. Manny was bought out by the town of Chelmsford, who purchased his farm (which at the time Manny tells me had 52 "milkers" - in other words, a good size operation) as the site for the new high school.

John worked at farming for a couple of years and decided a farming career was not for him. (Read John's classmate profile/snapshot later in this column.) Franklin continued his family operation, which now harvests and sells hay primarily as winter fodder for cattle and horses. Franklin's family had "worked that land" since 1699, having been granted ownership of the property by the Governor.

As a point of interest, I looked back

at my brother Ted's 1935 CHS yearbook, and of his class, 12 people were supposedly headed for lives as farmers -- this contrast shows the changed complexion of our hometown from agricultural to a suburban bedroom community for not only Lowell, but Route 128 businesses and the city of Boston and its immediate area as well.

True to form, Franklin married a local woman, and fellow CHS graduate, Mary Lewis, who even lived on his street. They had four children, all who live in New England. His older sister, Martha, lives next door in the Joseph Warren homestead home built in 1889.

The property has been in the family since the house was built in 1889 - never sold to another family.

Our yearbook describes Franklin as well scrubbed and immaculate, dressing in good taste and an outstanding gymnast, but baffled by physics - Franklin, you were not alone on the Physics part!

Franklin and Mary attended our 60th Reunion at the Vesper Country Club last October 6 where Mary was one of the lucky winners of a quilt hand made by classmate Jeanette (Card) Blake.

With Franklin's death, we lost a pillar of the Chelmsford community. You'll be missed, good friend.

Dick Wright severely hurt.

Dick has what is called "Charcois (Sharko) Foot" which became seriously infected in May landing him in Emerson Hospital in Concord for a month of treatment and rehab. He returned home with what his wife, Binki, described as a "black boot" that he wore to keep any weight bearing off his foot. One morning as he made his daily trek

down the stairs (on his butt) for breakfast, his boot snagged on the top step and he did a free fall down the 13 steps fracturing his neck, ribs, back and vertebrae, virtually compromising his entire body. After being rushed to Lahey Hospital in Burlington, he developed severe MRSA pneumonia where he spent 7 weeks in ICU on a ventilator, neck brace and feeding tubes.

No longer will the mean trombone blow: John Buzzell died August 21.

For the past few years, John had been plagued with many health issues; congestive heart failure and a massive heart attack finally took his life. He was a graduate of the University of Maine with dual degrees in Agricultural Engineering and Mechanical Engineering. Right out of college, he joined Allis Chalmers where he worked almost his entire professional life. He met his wife Mary in Indiana and they were married for 56 years. They had three children who have given their parents six grandchildren. He was selected as a Plant Manager for the Allis Chalmers Oxnard CA plant and lived in Camarillo, a suburb of San Francisco. John loved fishing and named his boat GROUNDHOG for the day on which he was born. John's funeral was held in the Camarillo Methodist Church where he and his family were members for 30 years. John also loved antiques and Mary tells me at times, the size of his collection bordered on him being a "hoarder."

John was presented with a Volunteer Award for organizing a 12-man team that met every Monday to collect and repair older farm implements and actually opened a museum displaying these implements in Santa Paulo CA. John's favorite city in the world was Fryeburg ME where, as a youngster, he spent summers with his cousins at their Grandparents' farm. The

highlight of these years was attending the Fryeburg County Fair. John attended the 2014 Fair prior to attending our October 6th 60th class reunion.

CAROL (NICKERSON)
BURLEIGH - Tulsa, Oklahoma

When Carol was asked how she came to be living in Tulsa, Oklahoma, she said it all went back to a German class she took at the University of New Hampshire in 1956, or maybe even further back to a love for languages instilled in her at CHS by taking two years of Latin with Christine Booth and three years of French with Mildred Hehir.

Carol transferred to UNH from Bates and graduated cum laude in 1957 with a degree in Biology, a new love. If she had not met her future husband, she might have gone to study primitive tribes in the jungles of Brazil! However, Hugh Burleigh, a Korean War veteran from Franklin, NH, captivated her with his blue eyes that were the exact color of his Chevy convertible! They just happened to take a German language class together. After they were married in 1957, Carol worked for one year in the university poultry lab while Hugh finished his degree. She laughed and said she supported him for one year and he has supported her for the next 57 years!

Hugh went to work in the research labs for Singer Sewing Machines in Bridgeport, CT and Elizabethport, NJ. During this time their two daughters, Diane and Susan were born.

Then in 1963, (here is the German thread), Hugh was offered the position of director of research for the Singer Company in Germany. Carol was ecstatic because she also had an adventurous spirit, beginning

when she ran away from home at age 8 heading for Africa! They settled into a German community, putting the girls into a local school, speaking German daily with shopkeepers and neighbors, and adapting to the customs, such as all stores closing at noon Saturday for the entire weekend. The people were friendly, but formal and polite, never using first names, always Herr or Frau Burleigh. After six years, Carol was on a first name basis with only one neighbor! But some did become friends for life. A childless older couple became like grandparents to their children, especially after their son, Lawrence was born there.

When Hugh was asked to be president of the Singer Company in France, Carol looked at this move as another learning opportunity. She could use her French and learn about another culture. While the girls were at the American School of Paris learning French as well as English writing and grammar, Carol took every opportunity she could to visit the beautiful cathedrals and museums in Paris. The family took

short trips to Versailles, the castles along the Loire, Mont St. Michel on the Normandy coast, and the cemeteries at Omaha Beach. Arranging vacation trips took Carol many hours of writing letters; they were able to drive to Denmark, Norway, and Sweden one summer, visit Italy during another one, and take several ski trips to Switzerland and Austria. The French people tended to be aloof but the food was wonderful.

After remaining abroad for three years, the family “earned” vacations in the United States. They bought a summer cottage in Meredith NH on Lake Winnepesaukee that they kept for 20 years. Carol went there every summer with the children, her mother, and their dogs while Hugh came when he could. This was America for the children – boating, waterskiing, hiking, eating ice cream, seeing relatives, and talking “Yankee.”


The German thread was picked up again when the German company Robert Bosch wanted to establish a factory in Charleston SC and asked

Hugh to be president. Learning to understand “Southern talk” was a challenge! It was a difficult move after ten years in Europe and having teenagers who had never lived in the US. Again, everyone adapted and Carol began her many years of volunteer activities – PTA, private school treasurer, poll watcher during elections, and managing rentals of their property on Kiawah Island, SC. The warm ocean waters were delightful!

After six years, the German thread brought them to Tulsa OK. A Liechtenstein company, Hilti, chose Hugh to be president of their new company there. This time Carol and family decided to stay. Tulsa does have many American Indians and buffalo but it also has museums, symphony orchestras, ballet and opera companies, lakes, rolling hills, and many opportunities to volunteer. Carol has delivered Meals on Wheels, helped at Planned Parenthood, served as a docent at one museum, taught adults reading the library, and is still a reading tutor at an elementary school in a deprived

neighborhood. Carol has also been very active in the local Unitarian church. It has 2,000 members and is a bulwark against the radical conservatism of Oklahoma! She has also found a way to use her biology degree by serving on a hospital board that reviews ongoing clinical trials, testing new medicines with oncology patients.

When they came to Tulsa, they decided it was time to see the US. They hiked into the Grand Canyon. They skied in CO, NM, UT, OR, and Mt. Whistler in British Columbia Canada. They have visited all the National Parks and have been in every state except MN, WV, and HI. Their daughter Susi, a watercolor artist, lives in Portland, OR with three children so there are many trips there. They also take a family ski trip every year to Park City, UT.

Their son Lawrence, an engineer with an MBA, lives in Tulsa and their daughter, Diane, a company comptroller, and a grandson live nearby in Kansas City. Tulsa also is half way between the two coasts. They return east often to visit Carol's brother, Ralph at Hampton Beach NH and her cousin Pamela Byam at Baptist Pond, South Chelmsford.

Retirement gave them more time to travel and learn about more cultures. Carol always makes sure to learn a few phrases in each language. Some highlights were the Galapagos Islands where Charles Darwin had been, Thailand, with its Buddhist culture, golden temples, and serene Buddhas, Tanzania, where the Leakeys discovered the skull of 2 million year-old pre-human, Lucy, and Prague, Czechoslovakia where

Jan Hus, called the first Unitarian, was burned at the stake in 1415 for heresy. Carol also loves the Renaissance cities of Rome and Florence for their magnificent architecture, paintings, and sculpture. Soon they will visit their 28th country, China. Carol has already learned that "nee-how" means hello!

At home, Carol likes to do crossword puzzles, dabble in watercolors, and read good fiction with her book club. She feels a deep sense of gratitude for the opportunities she has had and for the friends she has made along the way. To paraphrase Henry David Thoreau, she has tried to live life deliberately, to learn what life has to teach - so that when she comes to die she can say she has really lived. And she hopes to have made a positive difference in a few people's lives.

CLASSMATE PROFILE: JOHN (JACK) GRAVELLE - Plymouth, Massachusetts

Jack never did become a farmer as was predicted in our Lions yearbook and found that the trucking industry was a more lucrative field. He began hauling sand, stone, and gravel for local companies and then moved on to join the Teamsters and hauled freight around New England for two Lowell companies. He eventually went to work for Duane Building Wrecking Co. in Quincy, which brought him to live on the South Shore. For the men who are reading this, perhaps the most interesting aspect of Jack's time with the wrecking company was that he was part of a crew who tore down Scollay Square and the entire west end of Boston for a large urban renewal project. Many of us remember attending the Old Howard and getting some of our first learning about what women were all about. Jack tells me that remains of Scollay Square and the Old Howard now

rest at the bottom of a quarry in Quincy. Young men today do not know what they missed. For those of us who lived around Boston, it was part of growing up.

After several years with Duane, Jack bought his own trucks and worked hauling stone from Chelmsford quarries as part of the clean-up of the Merrimack River in Lawrence and Haverhill. He also hauled stone from a quarry in Hingham to build the Plymouth Harbor seawall and worked on the building of Interstate 195 from Wareham to New Bedford.




