




CHS STUDENT PROFILE

This student profile could take the time to list her honors, such as membership in the National Honor Society, and being a recipient of the National Hispanic Scholarship Fund. The listing of achievements is just a reflection of the actual person which Laura is. The journey which has brought this unique student to Chelmsford High School is one worth reading about. And the future she is about to embark on is one we definitely need to watch.

At first impression, Laura's characteristics of being a mature, outgoing, responsible young woman are evident. Upon hearing her story, it is clearly evident as to how these traits have become a permanent part of her persona. At the young age of eight, Laura's family was faced with a lifetime decision of relocating from their home country of Colombia in order to receive better medical care for her sister, Lina. Six years younger, Lina had been diagnosed with a tumor pressing against her eye. The tumor would not only eventually lead to blindness, but would also prove terminal. Health care resources in Colombia were not available to care for Lina's condition. At this period of Laura's life, her family voyaged to Moscow, Russia, to

search out treatment. After discovering that care in Moscow would not save Lina's life, Laura's father then searched around the world by using the Internet to find a hospital or doctor who could save his daughter's life. Luck was found in Boston, where the Massachusetts Eye and Ear Infirmary believed they could treat her. Within days, Laura and her family departed Moscow for Boston. "The hospital personnel met us at the airport," she recounts. In order for follow-up care to continue for Lina, Laura's family made the decision to stay in the Boston area. This decision included Laura leaving behind everything she had known, including a very close family in Colombia. Her father left a successful career. Her mother sold a store. The family's home was sold. Laura, also, knew no English.

At the age of eight, Laura began school at The Franco American School in Lowell. "I didn't have bilingual classes. Everything was in English," Laura said. "At first it was so incredibly hard. But by summer I could communicate." Laura credits the patience and help of the Franco American staff for helping her through her six months at Franco American. She began in January, and amazingly by summer she was able to speak in her second language. Her family also underwent amazing changes, with her dad work-

ing toward a career change and obtaining a masters' in Engineering. Despite Laura's amazing achievements during this transition period, she is still humble about her achievements. Laura and her sister, Lina, are extremely close. Lina is a student at McCarthy Middle School. "The school has been so great about getting her what she needs - for mobility and equipment," Laura insists. Laura credits much of her own learning from what her sister experiences. "I need to let her learn from her own mistakes," Laura explained. Dealing with Lina's blindness provides her with a unique perspective on how to see the world, and how to see people from within. Hence, Laura possesses a sense of empathy that few have. With her sister, Laura at times struggles with "letting her know that she's like everyone else." One common interest both sisters share is the love for the violin. They are involved with the orchestras at both schools, and continue with private instruction.

When asked about Chelmsford High School, Laura has nothing but great things to say about her alma mater. "It's here that I learned that I like playing the violin!" she says enthusiastically. She lists numerous items that are great about the school, including the activities, anatomy labs, and the orchestra. When asked about which

ENERATIONS" MARK PHASES OF A FAMILY OR SOCIAL UNIT, THEY SPAN TIME, HOLD FIRM REGARDLESS OF PHYSICAL SPACE. GENERATIONS LEARN FROM EACH OTHER, IMPACT ONE ANOTHER, AND CAN BE PAST OR FUTURE.

When CHS '87 alumnus David Scaplen set up shop back in Chelmsford in 2001, he aptly chose the name "Generations" to identify his independent physical therapy and sports medicine clinic. After all, Chelmsford was home to four generations of the Scaplen family and his practice treats multi-generational clientele ranging from age three upwards.

While David knew he would enjoy becoming more active in his community, what began to take shape over the past five years became an interesting crossing of generations which celebrated accomplishments forward and backwards through time. Those who were once teachers became students, and the student became the teacher. What has unfolded is a connectedness of a community, its people, values and strengths – all of which can have a profound impact.

David makes a point to say he grew up in North Chelmsford. His parents, Jack Scaplen ('58) and Patricia Dunlavey Scaplen ('60) both grew up in North Chelmsford. As a child, David walked to his elementary school, the North School, now replaced by the beautiful Senior Center and Housing complex. His practice today has a 01863 zip code, technically being located in North

Chelmsford, just shy of the Drum Hill rotary.

SWIMMING

While at Chelmsford High School, David was an accomplished swimmer, participating in the sport competitively year-round on United States Swimming private teams as well as the undefeated CHS boys swimming and diving team from 1983-1987. As successful as the team was in the Merrimack Valley Conference, a state championship eluded the team throughout its history of "near-victories."

With an opportunity to return to high school swimming in 2001, David was thrilled beyond imagination to work with a talented group of student-athletes to clinch the school's very first Massachusetts State Swimming & Diving Division I Championship. Many of these young men were part of a private team David had coached in the late 1990's as youngsters.

"A piece of advice I received from Al Thomas, my former CHS swim coach, was that as exciting and thrilling as it is to win a big meet, as proud as you may be of a swimmer who earns a state championship, what is most rewarding for a coach is watching the growth and improvement of someone who may

not be the most winning, someone who may begin their first season just barely making it through the early workouts. He was right. Watching these athletes struggle, learn, push themselves, and then wrap up the season (or their final year) swimming as a respected, contributing member of the team is amazing. I celebrate the personal growth that a student achieves and how that adds to the dynamic of a team's achievements."

Being able to work with students over the four-year coaching experience he had at CHS, Scaplen doesn't bring up the first ever, then second and third state championships. He mentions how fortunate he was to watch an entire class of kids go through the program and mature into fine young men, each with unique talents and skills in and out of the pool and how fortunate he was to get to know these now young adults.

PHYSICAL THERAPY

While at Chelmsford High School, David participated in the Pool Therapy program that assisted developmentally impaired children through pool exercise and play activities. He attended Northeastern University's Bouve College of Health Sciences where he obtained his degree in Physical Therapy. After working at New England Baptist Hospital and

in private practice north of Boston, he decided to venture on his own to create a patient-centered, personalized approach to orthopedic physical therapy.

Among his first patients was former CHS principal and long-time family friend, George Simonian, who had undergone a knee replacement to keep up with an active lifestyle.

David remarked that although it was a role-reversal to be the one telling Mr. Simonian what to do, his confidence as a professional kept him focused on treating him as a patient. As the years have gone by, David finds that he sees more parents of friends, teachers, and those who were influential, role-models in his life, coming to him now for professional advice and care. It's a chance for him to repay those who enabled him to achieve his goals by helping them through rehabilitation.

INFLUENCES

When asked about Chelmsford High School, David prefaces his response by acknowledging he may be guilty of repeating the same claims of Mr. Simonian, former CHS principal, and former dean and now School Committee member Angelo Taranto, and other leaders in the Chelmsford School system.

"CHS prepares you for any path you may wish to take after graduation. As a student, you are expected to and challenged to do your best, and in doing so, it brings out the best in you. CHS encourages every student to strive to reach goals, rise to challenges, and meet the opportunities of the ever-changing world. When you leave CHS, you have what you need to continue to grow and succeed. There is a foundation laid from which you can build whatever you'd like."

When asked about memorable teachers at CHS, David immediately recalls Mr. Andy Sorenson, who was able to

bring potentially abstract concepts of physics to life in a very real, practical way. "To this day, I remember a demonstration of torque Mr. Sorenson had a student lead by spinning a bicycle wheel and move it upwards. While I was learning flight mechanics in preparation for aviation, those concepts came back to me with the examples I learned in that physics class. It took a lot of the mystery out of the science and helped us students bring it off the page and into our lives."

LEARNING NEW THINGS IN LIFE

David has taken on some different passions and experiences as an adult. From rock-climbing after college, to picking up the game of rugby, to learning to play guitar, and working on his private pilot's license, he enjoys the challenges of trying something new.

"Learning new things can give you a refreshed or new perspective on life and allows you to explore difference aspects of your world. Whether it's physical activity or an art form, you can add dimension to your life and experience your world in a new way and help shape who you are," Scaplen believes. "If you see something you might like to do, try it! At the least, it will bring you in touch with people, things, and places you may never have otherwise had a chance to meet or experience."

THOUGHTS FOR THE NEXT GENERATION

As the father of two boys going through the Chelmsford school system today, Scaplen encourages them and today's youth to explore, find better ways to help people and the world around them. Don't do things because someone tells you to - do them because it is the right thing. Do what's in your heart. Learn new things without forgetting what you already know.

"Think outside the box and look at what may be possible beyond the typical or existing ways of doing things or looking at life. You can always return to the box."

David lives in Chelmsford with his wife Christine Frassica Scaplen ('87) and their two boys, Sean (a 5th grader at the Parker School) and Timothy (in the 2nd grade at Byam). His physical therapy practice, Generations Physical Therapy & Sports Medicine, is located at 10 Research Place in North Chelmsford and 134 Middle Street in Downtown Lowell.

HELMSFORD HIGH SCHOOL is a unique place, so it's no surprise that we hold a unique Hall of Fame celebration. Unlike other schools, where only athletic accomplishments are celebrated during Hall of Fame inductions, the Chelmsford Alumni Association's Hall of Fame evening brings together alumni of the highest caliber in various achievements. This year of 2007 was no exception. Outstanding educators, scholars, community activists, businesspeople, a veteran, coaches, and more stood at the podium to receive the prestigious award. Once again, the audience was awed by all that Chelmsford graduates achieve.

President Terry McSheehy began the evening by highlighting the amazing endowment that the CHSAA holds, benefiting the future education of the students of our school. Representing the classes of 1923 through 2006, as of this year there are seventy-eight scholarships awarded to high school seniors and CHS alumni. The endowment has now hit the \$1 million dollar mark, and this year alone over \$46,000 in scholarship monies were awarded. The endowment continues to grow. For a public institution, this is an amazing achievement. At this year's Hall of Fame, Terry McSheehy introduced a new addition to the scholarship list - The Dr. Henry Zabierek Scholarship, in honor of the former editor of the Lion's Pride. This award was named for Henry for his countless years of dedication to the CHSAA publication, which keeps the organization connected.

Chelmsford High School Principal Al Thomas provided the attendees with a handout with the many accomplishments of his students. The pride in Principal Thomas' voice is strong and clear; ours is a high school where students achieve in a variety of areas – academic, extracurricular, athletic, and individual pursuits. The staff is also composed of high achievers. He graciously thanked those who make Chelmsford High School a genuine success, both the faculty and staff at the high school, the three deans, and also the central administration and staff. He praised their commitment and loyalty to our schools.

The main event of the evening, the presenting of the inductees, was led by our Executive Director, George Simonian. The first recipient, David Abbott, Class of 1970, was noted by Mr. Simonian as being a "true scholar," as a university professor of anthropology and archeology. Mr. Abbott spoke of his troubles with reading as a younger child, and credited his success to his reading instructor, Mrs. Harper, who always told him to check his spelling. In his later years, Mr. Forsley, his high school physics teacher, was instrumental in guiding him in the belief that he could do things even if they were difficult. Thanks were given to his family and friends.

Mehmed Ali ('84) was comical, and had fun roasting Mr. Simonian and other administrators while at the podium, all in good will. He thanked people for never giving up on him while at CHS, in particular Mr. Simonian, Mr. Taranto, and Mr. Lindsey, his guidance counselor. Mehmed also thanked his class agent, John Sousa. Currently Mehmed is the Coordinator of the Patrick J. Mogan Cultural Center in the Lowell National Historical Park. Credits to his name include being an author, veteran, and extremely active community participant.

Kevin Attar, from the Class of 1979, had extreme success as a high school athlete in baseball, football and basketball, with twelve MVC

championships to his name. He graduated from Davidson College, and went on to coach college football. His success at CHS continued throughout his life, and is being carried forward as he participates in numerous volunteer activities which focus on children and young adults. He was awed at the award he was receiving, saying that this was "a tremendous privilege for me." He cited Mr. Simonian as adding a personal touch, "He seemed to remember me as much as I remembered him." Kevin also spoke of the honor of being inducted along with his former coach, Tom Caito, stating, "His influence runs through so deep." Family is of utmost importance to Kevin, attributing his father instilling in him the value of hard work, and his mom always there to encourage him. His wife Anne, and girls Alyssa and Jacquelyn are at the center of his days; this year he celebrates his 20th wedding anniversary.

To lead from athlete Kevin Attar to coach Tom Caito as an award recipient seemed only natural. Coach Caito, as many still refer to him, is a Boston University graduate with three varsity letters. His list of accomplishments is lengthy, but includes being listed as one of the top ten football coaches in the history of Massachusetts. He is also listed in the Rhode Island and Massachusetts Football Coaches Halls of Fame. He is known for being a motivator across multiple domains, and continues to volunteer in community activities. Tom thanked his family and friends extensively, and stated with so much pride their accomplishments. Special thanks were given to Bruce Rich and Jack Fletcher, whom he thanked not only for their individual friendship, but also for the friendships they have extended to his family. Tom Caito ended with a quote worthy

of a plaque in of itself: "If I could start my life again, I would always be a coach, and I would always be a Lion."

Chelmsford Telemedia was the recipient of the Lucy E. Simonian Golden Lion Award in 2007 for their continuous support to the students of Chelmsford High School. This non-profit organization began in 1984 as Friends of Cable 43 with a \$25,000 grant. Led now by Tom Peterson, a teacher at CHS, Chelmsford Telemedia is available to anyone. With this service, CHS was one of the first five schools in the nation to introduce television into the curriculum. They have also won national awards for their football coverage.

CHS graduate from the Class of 1988 David Hedison was the next Hall of Fame recipient. Described by George Simonian as a "go-getter and a do-er for your team,' David's list of success includes being an award-winning Housing Authority Director for the Town of Chelmsford. His awards are local, regional, and national. Despite his achievements, he was quick to thank others. He thanked Claire Lynch from CHS, who at that time worked in the Career Center and gave him his first opportunity to work with the Housing Authority. With this beginning, David would later go on to become the youngest housing authority director in the United States. David complimented his staff, saying that they "walk the walk, and talk the talk." He continues to keep true to his commitment to keep seniors within the community of Chelmsford able to live here, to remain in the community in which they grew up.

for 1977, and today is a highly successful dental surgeon. Although a graduate of Colby College and Tufts Dental School, he cites Chelmsford High School as the place where "everything came together" for him. He thanks George Simonian for encouraging him to run for class president, and helping him through the difficult time in junior year after his father's passing. Steve's commitment to volunteerism continues today, as he participates in numerous children's and civic groups in California, where he has resided for the past twenty years. He also is widely published among dental professional association publications. He greatly thanked the CHSAA for the award.

No stranger to the Lion's Pride, Lynne McSheehy ('64) was the next inductee. While in high school, Lynne was an outstanding musical participant, active with choir, drama, the musical, and as a vocal solist. The 1964 yearbook described Lynne as "capability plus - who would rather sing and dance." She and her husband, Terry McSheehy, met in eighth grade, and years later attended the prom together. The rest is CHS (and CHSAA!) history. Lynne continues to be an extremely active community participant, with involvement too lengthy to list.

Another CHS coach was inducted this year, Randy Whitehead. Randy was an extremely successful teacher/ coach before his retirement. One of his first comments to the crowd was, "It has warmed my heart forever to see those who have traveled so far." He thanked his colleagues for his successful career, including George Simonian, George Bestes, John Conrad, Ed Quinn, and Angie Taranto. Randy's name is listed as a member of the Massachusetts Wrestling Coaches Hall of Fame. His activity as a successful leader for youth continued as he founded the

Town Youth Wrestling Program in Chelmsford, which is still extremely strong today. He also thanked Bruce Rich and Jack Fletcher for their support throughout the years. Randy truly appreciates the lifelong relationships he formed within Chelmsford. In addition, he spoke of the illness that has befallen one of his former athletes, Dave Tousignant. When hearing this new Hall of Fame inductee speak, one realizes that he truly still cares about others.

Our final inductee has put Chelmsford forever in celluloid. Lance Wilder ('86) is a background design supervisor for The Simpsons, where he has immortalized various Chelmsford spots such as Tony and Ann's pizza, the Chelmsford Public Library, Zesty's Pizza, and Skip's Ice Cream. He thanked the Hall of Fame committee for the honor, and praised at great length numerous teachers at CHS who influenced him. There was a "great educational program" at the high school, he noted, and stated that teachers who in particular who stood out included Ms. Reddy, Jeff Doherty, Eric Hoover, Paula Brown, Randy Whitehead ("he always wanted to see blood!"), and Mr. Mecedy. He stated of those who helped him that "God smiles on people who serve other people." Lance praised not only the college-level classes that Chelmsford presented, but that the variety of programs is so incredibly vital. He stressed that these teachers and courses pushed him to be not only a creative person, but a team member as well. When speaking of his personal success, Lance stated, "I don't believe in accidents" and also mentioned later on his favorite quote from the movie Spiderman, "With great power comes great responsibility." He wants to continue with the career he has now, and continue to make a difference. Although based in Los Angeles, which has the stereotypical

"every man for himself" image, Lance continues to participate in volunteer activities with the St. Jude Foundation. He is much based in his family life, with his wife, Maria, and four children, Nathan, Jessica, Miranda, and Jacob. He wants to make a difference, and believes that difference is in helping people help each other.

Once again, the evening of the Hall of Fame provided a vignette of nine outstanding alumni. We wish them success in their future endeavors, and look forward to hearing from them in the future.



CHELMSFORD'S VIETNAM VETERANS' MEMORIAL

George Dixon ('64) and the late John Emerson ('59) initiated the idea of an individual monument recognizing Kenny Hughes ('64). They met with town officials, all of whom were very supportive of the project. The Town allocated a patch of ground on the Vinal Square Common near Middlesex Street.

The project lingered for quite a while before George approached Chelmsford's Veteran's Agent Regina Jackson. A high quality committee was formed: Regina Jackson (USAF), Bob Casper (US Army), Bob Mackey (US Army – CHS '63), John Harrington (USMC – CHS '64), Dave McAllister (US Army), Jim Pearson, Town Engineer and, of course, George Dixon ('64).

In less than one year, this committee designed the monument, put it out to bid, and raised the necessary funds from some very wonderful supporters. The committee met every week with a diligence and purpose. The bid was awarded to Luz Granite. Adrian Luz attended a number of meetings to assist the committee with the design considerations.

The design now included all four soldiers that made the ultimate sacrifice: John F. Bettencourt, Kenneth R. Hughes, Peter V. Blazonis and James A. Doughty. All four were educated in the Chelmsford school system. All four were in Vietnam for only a few months when they lost their lives.

The memorial was installed on November 16th and dedicated on November 19th in front of about 200 people, including family and friends of the four soldiers. A brief biography of each soldier was read by each of the Vietnam veterans who sat on the committee. Thomas G. Kelley, a Vietnam veteran who was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor was the guest speaker. The ceremony lasted almost forty-five minutes, a brief period to honor and remember these four heroes.

The committee wishes to thank each of you that supported our efforts. ■
