EDITOR'S NOTE

Incredible turnout for an incredible kid

I know I wrote about John R. Carson's impending posthumous induction into our group's Hall of Fame last edition, but I was just so blown away by how many people came to honor his memory – some from a pretty long distance – that I had to close the loop on this great honor for him and his family.

John, who was captain of CHS' cross-country team as a junior, died on a training run with his teammates in late December 1987 when he was struck by a train. Since that tragedy, scholarships, the Fourth of July road race and so many more poignant mementos have sprouted to keep his legacy alive.

But the March Hall of Fame induction night was special in that it honored him for the student, athlete and person he was when he was alive.

I was surrounded by table upon table of John's family, friends, former teammates, coaches – even 2014 cross-country MVP and Sun Athlete of the Year Quinn Cooney attended to honor the memory of a great runner he never knew but probably wished he had.

I also got to finally meet John's mother, Linda, a woman who epitomizes grace and exudes love and appreciation for everyone, especially those who were close to her son as well as those devoted to remembering her special boy.

His father, John W. Carson, whom I had had the pleasure of meeting on several previous occasions, told me of the induction, "It's really a bittersweet moment. We're very proud that he's been recognized this way, but I think equal recognition needs to go to his teammates and his coaches who have supported each other and supported us these past 27 years."

During his acceptance speech, Carson asked those teammates and coaches to stand and be recognized by the sell-out crowd at the Radisson Hotel in Nashua, N.H.

Asked before the ceremony how his son would react to all the fuss being made about him on this special night, he said, "I think he'd be blown away. He wasn't one to seek honors for himself... he was a good athlete, a good student, but I think he'd be overwhelmed."

I had the privilege of being seated at the same table as some of John's relatives, as well as his elementary school principal, Robert Noy, who mentored John at the Westlands School.

"He was a wonderful young man," said Noy. "He stood out."

Noy said he just had a special connection with John. They just clicked.

"We talked about that a lot," Noy said.

That was unusual for a principalstudent relationship in those days, he noted.

"I had to know every kid, but I honestly feel he always stood out as

a caring, sensitive young man," Noy said. "He respected others. He was well-liked."

He was a great friend and teammate; that was obvious by the large turnout of his contemporaries who came to honor his memory.

Of course, Carson's teammate and best friend, David "Butch" Beaton was there. Beaton's Eagle Scout project was building a small park in John's name next to his church, Central Congregational, complete with a gazebo where John's sister, Laurie, was married in 2002.

"It's nice that people who didn't know him can finally get a glimpse of who he was," said Beaton.

Another teammate, Eric Beauchesne, who nominated his late friend for the honor, said, "It's neat so many of the guys are here. They're into it. It means a lot to them."

The fall after John's tragic death, the team went on to win the state championship without their leader, but it was his indomitable spirit that apparently carried them.

That, among other reasons, are why so many coaches came to the event: Jack Lang, who was there when tragedy struck, and Brian Crane, who came to know the family through the scholarship committee, to name a couple. But none came farther than Jim Durkin, now living in Colorado. He was John's head coach.

"To me it was one way to bring everyone together and remember Johnny," Durkin said, adding, he can't remember any teammates who were not there at the induction.

"For a coach, I mean, holy cow, to win a state championship without our best kid? He and Beauchesne were our 1-2 punch," Durkin reminisced. "Absolutely, for me, he (Hall of Famer John R. Carson) was with us running."

It's amazing to think that only a few weeks ago

we were all together at the CHSAA Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony, and now here we are at the close of another school year. As soon as the calendar turns to May, the intensity in the school picks up. I would like to think that we are busier than other schools, but when I talk to other principals they all say the same thing – May is a sprint. With SATs, the spring musical, AP tests, MCAS tests, Academic Awards, Activities Awards, Sports Awards, Pride Awards, CHSAA Scholarship Night, the 24 Hour Relay, Town of Chelmsford Scholarship Night, Mock Car Crash, Mentor training, JFK Museum Field Trips, and Senior Week activities, CHS is a veritable hub of activity all day and all night.

When students first arrive to CHS as 9th graders we talk about getting involved in "Chelmsford After Dark." As much as CHS is bursting with 1600 students every day, it's the students who are here after the 1:51 bell rings that really make this place special. On any given day we have another 1000 students who are here after school as late as 10 p.m. It's no surprise that these students who give the most of the their time to CHS, are the ones who receive the most for their efforts. The after dark crowd has found its niche. By pursuing their passions, and giving of themselves to groups, clubs, and teams, they truly have demonstrated CHS Pride.

I also wanted to extend my personal thanks and appreciation to the CHSAA. As you may have heard, I will be the Principal at Marlboro High School starting July 1st. This was very much a quality of life decision, giving me the chance to do the job I love while being much closer to home to spend time with the people I love, my wife and three great kids. It's been great to come back home to serve the community that gave me so much.

I have highlighted a few of our end of year accomplishments below and a few other pieces from the speech I delivered at the Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony in March. Have a great summer, everyone!

- · All five of our National Merit Scholarship Contest Semifinalists were officially named as finalists. In fact, two students were recipients of scholarships valued at \$2500.
- CHS Rankings:
 - o Ranked 53rd in U.S. News and World Report's 2015 Best High Schools Survey
 - o Ranked 246th in Newsweek's America's Top High Schools Survey
 - o Ranked 69th in MA by NICHE's Best School Districts in America

- The theatre guild received a record 23, TAMY Nominations for its performance of Mary Poppins. Some of the award nominations are for Best Overall Production, Best Director (Lauren Cochran), Best Musical Direction (Amanda Roeder), Best Actor, Best Actress, and a host of others. What an amazing production! I hope that you all had a chance to see it as it was absolutely terrific.
- 12 of our DECA students were recognized as MA state finalists. Seven of these folks qualified for the International Competition in Orlando, FL. All seven along with their advisors, Andy Shupe and Tommy Sousa, represented Chelmsford well in FL. At the time of this write up we hadn't heard final results.
- Under direction of our Band Instructor, Mr. Sexauer, our Marching Band has been recognized nationally, again, this year. The band has been called to Washington D.C. as the MA representative to participate in the National Independence Day Parade. The band has also been invited to play the National Anthem at Fenway Park in September when the Toronto Blue Jays come to town. Does that mean they get to play two anthems?
- Our Mock Trial team qualified for the Elite Eight this year in the annual mock trial tournament. This represents our highest finish in the past few years, and bodes well for the future.
- We held our first ever Pride Week this past April. Thanks to the Thomas Jefferson Forum, Interact, Best Buddies,

and Key Club, we were able to have a four day event where kids demonstrated pride. One event, Pride in your Community, was a collective service project. Through generous contributions from the Chelmsford Rotary, approximately 150 of our students were able to gather in the gymnasium and assemble meals for hungry people. By the end of the hour, our students had packaged almost 12,000 meals for needy families. The event also incorporated a spirited, "House Games" competition with numerous activities. Whittier came out on top this year.

- A core group of our Resiliency students hosted a dance as a fundraiser to benefit the Dana Farber Institute and cancer research. In a few short weeks, and one fun, neon night, this group raised over \$3000 for cancer research. Amazing!
- One of our PLUS blocks took matters into its own hands to benefit the folks of Nepal who suffered a tremendous tragedy from the recent earthquake. In the span of 3 days travelling to PLUS blocks, this group collected nearly \$1100.
- Our LIME (Leadership In Motion Everywhere) group is preparing for its annual 24-hour relay on May 30th and 31st. About 50 teams of ten students will participate in a relay around the Carson track for 24 hours to raise money for the community. This event raises over \$30,000 for town and community organizations.
- One of our most powerful events of the year, our annual Mock Car Crash, took place on May 15th. In its 19th year, this event is for our 11th and 12th graders and shows students the realities and consequence of driving while under the influence. In addition to the core group of faculty members who coordinate the event, it would not be possible without the support of the Chelmsford Coalition for LiveSmart, the Chelmsford Police Department, the Chelmsford Fire Department, Trinity Ambulance, Dolan Funeral Home, and Circle Health (formally Lowell General Hospital).
- And a special thanks to the CHSAA for its tireless efforts in providing scholarships to members of our graduating class in excess of \$50,000. Absolutely, incredible. Thank you to all of you for your contributions. Your investment in these students is powerful and only strengthens our school, community, and our organization for years to come. I'm excited to join you all on May 27th. ❖



"Oh, the Places You'll Go!"

It was quite fitting at the May 16, 2015, UMass Lowell graduation ceremony that Student Trustee Phillip Geoffroy, recipient of the Chancellor's Medal for Student Service, not only proudly accepted his UML degree in Political Science, but also had the distinct honor of presenting Chancellor Marty Meehan with the University Distinguished Service Medal, in recognition of his eight years as chancellor. Geoffroy praised Meehan saying, "Chancellor Meehan's refusal to accept mediocrity, his willingness to make bold decisions, and his unparalleled pride for the institution from which he graduated have forever altered the course of this university's history....He has established a legacy that will endure long after his departure from this campus; he inspired us all to believe that anything is possible."

During his four years as a UML student, Phillip Geoffroy, indeed, was inspired to believe that "anything is possible." This hard-working, exceptionally well-spoken, forwardthinking young man embraced every opportunity to work towards making a difference and improving the lives of others. A look at this remarkable young man's enterprising spirit, coupled with his genuine compassion, suggests that Phillip Geoffroy's commitment to serving the public has only just begun. In the words of Dr. Seuss, "Oh, the Places You'll Go!"

Phil attributes his smooth transition into four extremely successful years at UML, in part, to CHS's high academic standards. "I had great teachers, learned a lot and was well prepared for college." Recalling Ben Cole's AP Government class, Phil says, "Mr. Cole reaffirmed my interest in politics and in government. He was a great teacher and Mock Trial coach." Phil adds that he enjoyed Jeremy Greene's AP World History class and learned a great deal in his class.

While Phil may suggest that he "flew under the radar" during his CHS years, his teachers paint a different picture. AP government teacher Ben Cole comments that "with respect to the faculty, we all love Phil. It's nice to have adult conversations about politics, the economy, current events, and where society is going with the younger generation, especially when you know that the younger student, with whom you are

engaged in conversation, is not being pretentious, but rather is genuinely interested in making the world a better place. Phillip Geoffrey is a wonderful human being." Ben goes on to say that Geoffroy "could hold his own with William F. Buckley, Jon Stewart, George Will, and more importantly, the common man."

Likewise, Kathryn LaFlamme recalls that in her International Relations class, Phil's love of history and current events was evident throughout every class discussion. Phil was always so insightful and had a great sense of humor. I know that he will go far."

A look at Phil's UML schedule speaks to how far he has gone and just how much he has accomplished in his four years at UML. Phil successfully balanced a schedule that included attending five classes, working in different internship programs each semester, and fulfilling his obligations as a member of both the Board of Trustees and the Executive Board of the UML Student Government. At the same time, he worked passionately on many trustee, as well as campus and community initiatives.

At the end of Phil's freshman year, a *Lowell Sun* article recognized him for his efforts to draft a resolution, condemning the vandalism at Babylon, an Iraqi restaurant in Lowell. As a result, students and members of the community rallied at the restaurant to show their support of the owner. In an interview for


that article, Phil is quoted as saying, "Lowell's a city that really owes its greatness to its diversity, and I saw that threatened. The incident provided an opportunity to prove that diversity is welcome in Lowell."

Also at the end of his freshman year, Phil ran for and was elected as the youngest student to serve on UML's Board of Trustees. Re-elected in the two subsequent years, Phil served as a student trustee for three years. "I am most proud of earning the support of my peers for those three consecutive years," Phil shares.

Five student trustees, one from each of the five campuses, serve on the Board of Trustees. In any year, two, out of the five, are voting members. As a voting member his senior year, Phil reminisces, "I got to vote on the new president this year, and that was exciting. I also voted on new academic programs, reviewed new masters' programs, and voted on tenure for faculty members."

Geoffroy notes that his three years on the Board of Trustees was a great experience, particularly given the transformation UML had been undergoing. "Being a member of the board gave me an opportunity to be on the front lines and have a say in many important and exciting decisions such as the university's entrance into Division I Athletics, as well as the construction of the new state of the art Student Center." As a trustee, Phil had the opportunity to work closely with Chancellor Meehan. He recalls the time that Chancellor Meehan introduced him to then-Senator John Kerry and also remembers the interesting anecdotes that Meehan shared with him about such leaders as Ted Kennedy and Paul Tsongas.

When asked about Chancellor Marty Meehan, Phil responds, "Anyone who meets him is impressed by him. He is an outstanding leader and an inspirational role model for students. It sends a great message to have someone running UML who is both from Lowell and an Alum." Phil goes on to say that Meehan is especially revered in Lowell, which he says certainly can be felt at hockey games when everyone chants the chancellor's name. For Phil, Chancellor Meehan has served as a mentor. "I admired him when he was in Congress, and I got to vote to vote for him as UML president."

Initially, the trustee position appealed to Phil because he saw it as an opportunity to pursue a cause about which he is passionate, that of keeping public higher education affordable. When asked if he could solve one problem in today's world, what would it be? Phil responds, "I would like everyone who is academically qualified to be able to go through an institution of public higher education, such as UML or any other state university, without going into insurmountable debt." Phil goes on to say, that in his opinion, institutions of higher education represent the backbone of the economy, training the workforce of Massachusetts. He believes

that "making UML unattainably expensive makes no sense, especially when over 80% of the students attending UML, stay in state."

As a trustee, Phil is proud of his efforts to organize students to travel to the State House to advocate for more adequate state funding. "I have consistently used my position ... to advocate for this cause, for instance by partnering with my counterparts at the other UMass campuses to submit a statement to the governor asking for adequate funding." The last two years UML has been able to freeze mandatory in-state student fee increases because the state legislature was able to accomplish a 50/50 funding model, providing UML with funding to enable the freeze. "I'd like to think that the advocacy of students, making sure that their voices are heard at the state level, played a small role in that accomplishment." In addition, Phil has "been a leader in the fight to change a state law that establishes that only two of the five UMass Student Trustees may vote each year. I have fought for this unjust limitation of student input to be lifted."

Beginning in the summer of 2013, Phil played an instrumental role in a year-long initiative to ban the use of all tobacco products on campus. Phil recalls that Chancellor Meehan set up a meeting for him with Dr. Howard Koh, who at that time served as the Assistant Secretary for Health for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, and was a leader in the national effort to make college campuses tobacco free. Phil's meeting with Dr. Koh was the start of a year-long effort to gain the support of the student "Ultimately, another student and I brought the proposal before the faculty senate. It was the first time a student sponsored initiative

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had been brought before and approved by the senate." Phil adds that Chancellor Meehan, a staunch anti-tobacco advocate when he served in Congress, had attempted to make the campus tobacco free when he first became chancellor, but at the time it didn't work. "I am proud of my role and the roles of other students who were even more involved than I. It was a courageous effort of students standing up for something they believed in, and it paid off."

Through a UML Community Co-op Program, Phil interned at Lowell's Merrimack Valley Housing Partnership, a non-profit whose mission is to "promote responsible and sustainable home ownership opportunities for first time buyers." Phil interviewed home buyers who had gone through the program and profiled them in newsletters. He also created a promotional video for the MVHP. A UML publication states "The Merrimack Valley Housing Partnership (MVHP) won second place for a YouTube Video award thanks to the hard work and commitment of their UMass Lowell intern Phillip Geoffroy. Geoffroy is a junior in the Political Science program and works for MVHP as a marketing, outreach and support associate." It goes on to say, "By working with the MVHP, Geoffroy is aiding in making strides which will not only help the city of Lowell now, but improve the community long term." In addition to working on a number of political campaigns, both as an intern and as a volunteer, Phil, also worked on a number of gubernatorial campaigns, state senate campaigns, and congressional races; and interned in some political offices. Phil

recalls that he first became actively interested in the political scene during the 2008 presidential election, which he followed very closely.

Most thankful for his supportive family, Phil says, "I definitely could not have achieved what I have achieved to date without my parents." His parents decided to move to Chelmsford from Lowell so that Phil and his sister, Cora ('09), could attend Chelmsford schools. Phil's mom, Laura Herget Geoffrey is a 1977 CHS graduate.

Where does Phil hope to be in ten years? "I want to have worked in Washington D.C. in some capacity; I want to have earned a law degree; and I want to have worked as a public prosecutor." Why a public prosecutor? Phil goes on to say, "If I look at people whom I really admire and would like to emulate, they all got their start by working in the Middlesex District Attorney's Office." Phil hopes that people will remember him, from a young age, both for his commitment to serving the public and for his dedication to making his community and ultimately society better.

It is interesting to note that UML's mission "is to provide an affordable and accessible education of high quality and to conduct programs of research and public service that advance knowledge and improve the lives of the people of the Commonwealth, the nation and the world." Phillip Geoffroy is the personification of that mission.

HALL OF FAME Review

"No silver linings needed for Hall of Fame milestone"

When 382 people packed into the Nashua Radisson's ballroom on March 21, it was the Chelmsford High School Alumni Association's 25th anniversary of inducting nine deserving individuals into its allinclusive Hall of Fame. But rest assured, there were no silver linings necessary. From both the poignant and sometimes hilarious speeches of the inductees, to an all-around air of camaraderie and reminiscing, the night was a winner on all fronts.

Before recapping the night with truncated excerpts of those oratories, some of our group's leaders shared some impressive statistics and laurels.

CHSAA President Terry McSheehy noted that the organization was distributing \$42,725 in scholarships this spring to deserving seniors and graduates and that the endowment fund has grown to more than \$1.5 million. He also noted that Executive Director George Simonian and the CHSAA were being awarded the Chelmsford Historical Society's Guardian Award in May.

CHS Principal Charlie Caliri rattled off some highlights of how today's students continue to excel across all platforms. CHS was named a Level I school by the state, had five National Merit Semifinalists this year and 67 AP scholars.

Additionally, Newsweek magazine named CHS one of the top 500 high schools in the nation, he said. And on another positive note, Caliri said the CHS band was a semifinalist in the Bay State for the national Grammy competition, adding that we'd all miss their performance in this year's Chelmsford Fourth of July Parade because they'll be marching in the our nation's capital on that day.

"We all continue to take pride in the pursuit of excellence," Caliri concluded, citing the school's motto.

And this year's inductees have clearly done so.

John R. Carson Class of 1989

John R. Carson was a good student, an outstanding runner, an Eagle Scout and a true leader beyond his years, which made his death on a training run in December 1987 all the more tragic. His drive, his commitment and his goodness live on in the John R. Carson Road Race each July 4th as well as the scholarship in his name each year. His father, John W. Carson, spoke for his son.

"He would be blown away by this honor – as are we," he said, after thanking those who knew his son, especially Jim Durkin who was not only his teacher but his cross-country coach at CHS and traveled from Colorado to



attend the induction. "Durk, we're honored that you're here tonight.

"There is no way for a parent to prepare for the loss of a child, especially when it's sudden and unexpected. But one thing we quickly realized when we lost John was that we were not alone in our grieving. His fellow runners, students, fellow Boy Scouts, and many others were deeply touched by his death. This shared grief gave us all a sense that we weren't alone."

He spoke about the book, "When Bad Things Happen to Good People," and how there's no answer "why" to the question on this earth, but also how faith, family and friends helped them through it.

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"The scholarship in John's memory started when (John's mother) Linda had the brilliant idea to encourage donations instead of flowers at his wake and funeral. This is common today, but that wasn't the case 27 years ago. Contributions poured in from runners, friends, strangers, and Boy Scout troops all over New England and beyond. Despite all the donations, we wanted some way to sustain the scholarship. Fortunately, Bob Sullivan came along and volunteered to be Race Director for Chelmsford's John R. Carson 4th of July Road Race - a role he has continued now for 25 years. The last few years more than 2,000 runners have registered for each race."

He also spoke of the park his son's friend, David "Butchie" Beaton, built in his memory on Worthen Street near their church, and the establishment of a campership for Troop 74, his Boy Scout troop, to help kids enjoy a week at Camp Wah-Tut-Ka in New Hampshire, where the whole troop learns something about John each year when we announce the recipient.

To close, Carson quoted a Facebook entry his daughter, Laurie, posted after my column about John's impending induction appeared in The Sun.

"I am typically not one to post personal stuff, but I am so humbled and amazed by this. It's a wonderful tribute to my brother, but the real tribute goes to his teammates and friends. It's a true testament to them and how supportive they have been to us and to each other over the last 27 years... it means the world to me that he still holds such a special place in their hearts. So thank you to all you guys -- you are amazing."



J. Michael Chuma Jr., Class of 1978

J. Michael Chuma Jr. was an outstanding football player at CHS, and earned a scholarship after walking on to UMass Amherst, where he was awarded a BA in the hospitality industry and an MBA. He works for KMPG as a managing director and has been heavily involved in his community and church.

After eloquently thanking family and friends, some of whom came from as far away as Dallas, Chuma reflected upon how the honor made him reflect about his life.

"Chelmsford High School and the people I encountered taught me to always believe in yourself, the importance of a positive attitude, teamwork and commitment. My football coach, Tom Caito, encouraged me and my teammates to always believe in ourselves and, most importantly, to believe in our team. We were taught to be physically, mentally, and emotionally tough and no matter what challenge that life threw at

us, that as long as we believed, we could overcome," he said.

It helped him, he said, to become a walk-on and try harder than those who were invited to play football at UMass on scholarships. The end result, his own scholarship and being a member of a team that won three Yankee Conference Championships.

"My high school friend Paul Logan taught me the importance of a positive attitude," Chuma continued. "I believe Paul has always lived his life with the glass always being half full. In the summer of our sophomore year Paul suffered a spinal injury at Hampton Beach. As I watched Paul rehab from his injury, I marveled at his positive attitude given the challenges that were before him. I never heard Paul complain or feel sorry for himself.

"A football teammate of mine and captain of the 1976 team, Mike Dzedulonis, taught me the value of 'teamwork.' Dezi was all about team first ... While Dezi's life was cut much too short, the impact that he had made on me helped me to understand that no matter what an individual accomplishes the TEAM shares in the success. Every day of my life I embed the concept of teamwork that I learned from Dezi at work, in play, and in parenting my four children."

In ending, Chuma quoted a poem his mother shared with him, which read, in part, "If you think you are beaten, you are; If you think you dare not, you don't. If you like to win, but you think you can't, It is almost certain you won't... Life's battles don't always go; To the stronger or faster man. But soon or late the man who wins, Is the man who thinks he can."



Geoffrey D. Hall Teacher

Geoff Hall not only had a long distinguished career as a Chelmsford social studies teacher, he also was a longtime state representative for his hometown of Westford as well as a selectman. In the Legislature he focused largely on education, improving the lives of students and teachers alike.

After thanking his family and nominator Ed Scollan, a Hall of Famer himself, Hall said the evening was special for him.

"From the time I was in junior high, I had wanted to be a teacher," he said. "I started my career as a student teacher at what is today Town Hall. The first class I ever taught included Mike McGreevy and Tim Mullen," two of the other inductees. "And as much as they tried to break me, I was back the next year," he said, eliciting considerable laughter.

"The career paths I chose were 'people businesses'. They did not include stock options and profit-sharing. I was told by one of my high-school teachers that I could live modestly, but don't expect to get rich. He was right. However, there were more intangible and personal rewards that I could not put a pricetag on."

Hall then singled out several of his former students who went on to successful careers, including Principal Caliri and Chelmsford Police Chief Jim Spinney.

"I also had the privilege of representing the town in the state Legislature and the opportunity to work with and develop friendships with so many dedicated, hard-working individuals who make this town and school system great," he said.

Hall concluded on a comical note, relating the story of how each year when he taught the unit on slavery, the lesson would end with a skit, complete with props and so on. And after one student asked if they could use whips in their skit, Hall wondered aloud, "where are we going to get a whip?" "It never failed, one little girl would raise her hand and say, 'My mom has one of those."



David McCarthy Class of 1970

David McCarthy was a music man in high school, performing with his band, The Vibrations which went on to become the house band at the Commodore Ballroom in Lowell.

After graduating from Mount Wachusett Community College with a degree in law enforcement, McCarthy graduated from the New Hampshire State Police Academy and later U.S. Secret Service School, ultimately becoming a body guard for the Granite State's governor and a liaison for all presidential visits to New Hampshire. Those assignments afforded him the chance to forge a friendship with Red Sox great Ted Williams, and today he is the executive director of the Ted Williams Museum at Tropicana Field in Tampa, Fla.

McCarthy opened by thanking his teachers for giving him and his friends the opportunity to succeed by ensuring they had the skills needed to compete upon graduation from CHS.

Those communication skills helped him meet his future wife, Tina. He pulled her over for a motorvehicle infraction as a rookie cop. After he walked up to her car and saw how attractive she was, he said, 'Would you like me to write that up or do you wanna go out with me?' They fire cops for that now."

He also noted how teachers have a major impact on a student's life and how the respect never ends, even many years later.

"Five years after graduation I was a rookie trooper patrolling the highway in Nashua, N.H., when I stopped a speeding car with Massachusetts plates. I noted as the woman driving the car was trying to hand me her license she was shaking from being pulled over," he said. "Before I could calm her I noted her license said she was from Chelmsford. Then to my horror I recognized the name as Mrs. MacDougall, my French teacher!

"I gasped and she looked up and recognized me... asking in French, 'DAAA VID?' I answered, 'OUI.' From that moment on she was in

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control of the stop and I was the student. I didn't even give her a warning for fear she would correct the ticket and I'd get another F. The point is, I never would have struggled through French without her help and understanding and that would have prevented me from getting my credits to complete the college course, and thus would have hurt my future career.

"I remember when she drove off I felt like I had avoided detention all over again," he said. "That is the effect a teacher has on her student that never goes away. My teachers at CHS like Mr. Conrad, Mr. Quinn, and MacDougall and many more will always have a place of respect and admiration in my heart and the older I get the more I look back on those high school days and remember how lucky we were to have the experience of attending Chelmsford High School."



Michael J. McGreevy Class of 1975

Mike McGreevy was inducted not only for his talents as an athlete in high school (football, hockey and baseball), but also for his successful career as an entrepreneur for the past 25 years. While at Agility Manufacturing Inc., McGreevy created an internship program with UNH for business students that proved mutually beneficial, as two of the interns were hired upon graduation. He has also volunteered countless hours in Portsmouth, N.H., as a coach, Rotarian and shelter volunteer.

In opening his speech, McGreevy thanked the teachers, coaches and school administrators "who put up with me through the years." He thanked them and his family for giving him the foundation to make it to this moment.

"I believe the reason that I am here tonight is in large part to the lessons that I learned and have tried to live by and maybe pass on to others. At a very young age my mother gave me a record of: 'I'm little Johnny Everything and I can do most anything.' I listened to that over and over.

"Prior to my very first freshman football game, Coach Bove asked if I was ready and I said, "I thought so." He said, "wrong answer." He said the correct answer is that I was 'born ready.' I knew I was.

"When I was a junior in high school, I was extremely disappointed at not being elected captain of the football team. Bruce Rich told me that I was given a gift. Previous captains were so busy being captain that they missed out on having a great senior year. He told me I could turn this disappointment into becoming the MVP. I said that linemen / linebackers don't get that award and he said, 'prove them wrong.' I did. Thanks Bruce!"

McGreevy also spoke of lessons learned in the business world, doing what's right for the customer first.

After moving to Portsmouth, he coached many youth sports teams volunteered to teach a business course at Portsmouth High School as they had no business classes.

"Years after coaching and teaching I had kids come up to me that I barely remembered who let me know that something I shared stuck with them... What a feeling..., he said, concluding, "We touch many lives and we may never know the impact that we have on those people."



Timothy A. Mullen Class of 1975

Tim Mullen has had a long and distinguished military career after graduating from ULowell with bachelors degrees in both political science and business management and California Western School of Law. After joining the Naval Reserve in 1982, Mullen rose through the ranks and was confirmed by the U.S. Senate last year to become a brigadier general for the Massachusetts Air National Guard.

"With the 25th anniversary of the Hall of Fame and my 40th high school reunion, it got me to thinking about what high school tried to instill in me, and it really came down to three basic principles or 'goods,' Mullen related. "Be a good student, be a good citizen and be a good person, human being.

"As to the first, as many of my former teachers can attest to I was at the top of my class for ... maybe detention hall. But seriously, one thing I did take out of high school was my love of reading. I love to read, and it has benefitted me throughout my military and legal careers. Just the other day someone said to me - 'Moon, you look so young, how do you do it?' I responded – my love of reading. The person said – 'wait, your 58 but look 30 and you attribute that to your love of reading?' I responded – yes, unfortunately I read at a 3rd grade level.

"Next is being a good citizen. We all do this in different ways – we recycle, don't park in handicapped spots. Some do public service, teachers. Firefighters like John Robinson, a fellow 1975 graduate, or police officers like my sister Gail and brother Brian who are in the audience. Some, like myself and Mr. Simonian's children join the military," he said.

"Finally, there is - be a good person, a good human being. This is a life journey. For me I didn't really become a good person, a good human being until I met my lovely wife of 32 years – Sheila. I want to thank her for making me complete as well as my two sons – Henry, a senior at Bentley who will be working for Liberty Mutual upon graduation who is here with his girlfriend, and my youngest son, Tom, a freshman at University of Michigan who is here with his long hair.

"In sum I again would like to thank Dr. Sargent for nominating me and the committee... I am honored."



Keith O'Brien Class of 1982

Keith O'Brien was recognized not only for being a solid student and runner in high school, but also for his teaching and coaching runners at Tyngsboro High, where he has led the cross-country team to six division titles, including the last four in a row. He is highly regarded by his colleagues, his students and athletes alike.

"Chelmsford is a very important community to myself and my family, as we have been in the town for the last 50 years and I can count all my 5 brothers and sisters: Kevin, Kim, Karen, Kyle and Kara as proud CHS grads as well as 2 of my brother-in-laws," O'Brien noted.

He pointed out he's had three professions, teaching, being an EMT and coaching.

"Tonight we are lucky to have in attendance 3 of the great cross country coaches in this area: Phil Maia of Lowell High, Jim Durkin of Chelmsford and Bruce McMaster of Tyngsboro. Two coaches that certainly helped my own coaching immensely were my high school coach Jim Durkin and Tyngsboro head coach Bruce McMaster. Both were great coaches. Coach Durkin had the grind it out mentality and pushed everyone to reach inside for more and at the same time he made it fun...

"At Tyngsboro, I was the assistant under longtime Coach Bruce McMaster. Coach McMaster was one of the most noble guys out there, never looking for credit but would give out plenty to everyone else," he said. "After over 30 years of coaching he finished his coaching career at his last meet with a Massachusetts cross-country state title. He stressed team first and had great command of his athletes. Both Coach Durkin and McMaster beyond the wins and losses fostered intense loyalty to their programs and built the foundation for citizenship in their athletes that would serve them well later in life.

"As a coach I have been kind of a gypsy, coaching at Chelmsford to Westford to Tyngsboro. Make no mistake about it, it was always the kids that made us successful with their hard work, determination and talent," O'Brien said, giving special recognition to Chelmsford alum Amy Beauchesne and Westford Academy great Stephanie Pancoast as well as Tyngsboro's Amy Eithier, Colleen Morill, Michaelin Jaggers and Catie Riley.

O'Brien got a few chuckles when he noted his teaching career began with biology in Tyngsboro because his teachers said he was good at it.

"But after accidentally injuring a few animals and losing another one inside the high school, which we never found, the next year I was summarily moved to the math and social studies department for safety reasons," he said.

After rattling off a lengthy list of colleagues he was grateful to work with, O'Brien thanked his family,

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with a special nod to his parents.

"Our parents taught us to be respectful, work hard and be loyal and above all family first. It is certainly my mother and father who stressed in us the meaning of team (family) that I use every day and they would always to this day make sure we knew that what we do has meaning and purpose.

"Lastly, in the words of Mr. Simonian, I work in the field of education, the 'most important business in town,' and I have been very fortunate to have been able to meet and call friends the people I have had the opportunity to work with."



Elisa Simonian Ouellette Class of 1987

Elisa Ouellette had a wide swath of interests at CHS, from being a member of the swim team for four years to yearbook and class treasurer her senior year. In addition to receiving her BA from Bridgewater State in management science, she minored in math, which continues to serve her well as the treasurer of the CHSAA and as senior business operations manager for Cisco Systems.

She waxed nostalgic about her CHS years.

"It was an historic time... The year was 1987 and parachute pants and leg warmers were all the rage. The movie "Dirty Dancing" was in theaters, Sam and Diane were amusing us in the makebelieve Boston bar, Cheers and, the musical group, the Bangles' had a number one song called, "Walk like an Egyptian".

These were some of the important details of life in 1987.

"But I noticed something interesting as I considered this truly formative time in my life... It wasn't the songs or gossip or fashion trends of the day that came rushing back to me. What I could see and feel as though it was yesterday... was sitting in the counseling office being encouraged by Mrs. Mahoney when I didn't know what I wanted to do with my life. I remember my math teacher Mrs. Nordengren helping to build my self confidence in her own special way. And I can still see Christine Frassica, Julie MacPhee and I in full "duck costume" as we set off to the Senior Halloween Dance as Huey, Dewey and Louie.

"What I realized as I looked back over the journey that has brought me to this place can best be summarized by the simple words of philosopher William James who said..., "Act like what you do makes a difference...it does. "To all the CHS teachers and administrators that poured time and effort into my life... your labor made a real difference in my life and in the lives of hundreds of students by giving us a foundation for success in school, work and life. Thank you.

"To my lifelong friends, Christine and Julie... I've heard it said, 'A single rose can be my garden... a single friend, my world.' How rich my life has been to have had such great friends to weather the highs and lows of growing up. Thank you for your loyalty and support.

She also gave thanks to her Calvary Baptist Church family, especially Pastor Atula, as well as her husband, Mark and son Zachary for affording her the patience to volunteer in her community.

She saved the best for last, her parents, her dad, George Simonian, and mom, the late Lucy Simonian.

"Where some thought it must have been horrible, or even a nightmare to be the principal's daughter... truth be told...I was always just so proud of him...that it was actually pretty great," she said of the man who was timing her speech on induction night.

"Although my mother is not physically here, I know she is here in spirit. I feel my Mom's presence every day and have been blessed to have had such a special relationship with her... Her unwavering support was ever-present not only for her family, but also for anyone who knew her as a friend. It is through watching my Mom and Dad's devotion and commitment to do for others that I have tried to do the same. And I want to thank them for the difference they have made in my life."



Joanne Bousquet Sargent Class of 1976

Joanne Sargent began her career as a labor-and-delivery nurse at the former St. Joseph's Hospital, but today has two businesses, Sargent and Associates, which manages workers comp and medical evaluations, and Begin with Skin, a med spa. She is also an active volunteer in her community.

"I went to Notre Dame Academy in grade school. When I learned that several of my friends were leaving NDA to go to CHS, I worked up the courage to first ask and then beg my mother to let me go to CHS," Sargent said. "At first she declined my request, after all there were boys at CHS and being the oldest of 4 girls and having no brothers, led her down a path to imagine the unthinkable (she would later confess to me). But one night after much discussion, she tip-toed into my room, sat next to me on my bed and said that I could go to CHS. I remember looking up at the ceiling saying thank you God and making myself a promise that my mother would never regret this decision, the pressure was on!"

Her first year, because of overcrowding, the school was on double sessions, but there were good times nonetheless. "I have fond memories; one in particular was the CHS talent competition. I am best remembered in the 9th grade as one of the "Jet's". 9 young girls with long dresses and boa's dancing to "Hey Big Spender". We did not win."

She did, however, win the heart of the future Dr. Michael Sargent, himself a CHSAA Hall of Famer.

"It became clear even at a young age that we shared many of the same passions, our love for the ocean, antiques, and hard work. Like anything in life that is truly worthwhile marriage too takes hard work and I would do it all again. It has shaped who we both are today," she said.

Sargent noted how her father being a doctor inspired her to become a nurse, which proved fortuitous on several fronts.

"My decision to become a nurse has been very gratifying. The greatest feeling in the world for me, is to know I helped to save lives. In no way, however, could I have imagined that one day I would have helped save the life of someone I love.

One night after working a double... I left the ER to go home. As soon as I turned onto North road on a rainy night just before Thanksgiving, I came upon a serious accident.

"I approached the young driver who was on the side of the road crying and asked her if everyone was all right. She cried out that Jennifer was in the car. My heart dropped as I looked into the car I saw my baby sister in the front seat of the passenger side, not seat belted she had gone through the windshield," she said. "I mustered every ounce of calm and focus I could while I worked to save her life. There were no Paramedics in those days and so I was the paramedic, nurse, angel and sister all rolled into one. My sister Jennifer survived, and

is here to share this evening with me. For me saving a life does not get more rewarding than that."

And with that, a quarter-century of celebrations is in the books.

"It's such a wonderful event and to see it come together... it's like a big reunion for all of us," McSheehy said in a post-ceremony interview.

Near the end of the evening, a beaming Simonian reminded the crowd how happy he was that it was the largest crowd ever.

"I love this. It's very heartwarming," he said.

Somewhere from the back of the ballroom came a small chorus of, "We love you!"

Yeah, we do. 🔷

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
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The 2014/2015 winter season was another successful one for all of our CHS teams.

There were over 490 winter athletes participating in 12 varsity and 12 sub-varsity programs, as well as a student-training program with 10 student trainers. The overall varsity winter record was 77-56-5.

All but one team qualified for the post-season tournaments. The girl's basketball and boy's ice hockey teams advanced to the Division 1 North Semi-Finals, the girl's basketball team also won the MVC II championship for the fifth straight year. Our boys swim team won the MVC Championship Meet and the wrestling team won the Division I North Tournament for the first time in many years.

There were many individual accomplishments as well. Three of our winter athletes won state titles, Griffin Murray and Davie Goodall in wrestling and Andrew Majeski in swimming. We also had 26 of our student athletes named to all conference teams, 26 were named to all-star teams and two of our coaches were named Coach of the Year; Kevin Branco and Craig Vitale. A special congratulation goes out to long time coach Bruce Rich (Football, Wrestling and Softball) as earned his 1000th career victory in coaching this past wrestling season.

Boys Basketball

The Boys Basketball Team finished the regular season with a 5-15 record. The team always battled hard and played in some very close games; unfortunately they suffered some major injuries to some key contributors. The highlight to the season was a home win vs. a highly ranked Andover team. Team member Jack Campsmith was named to the MVC All Conference Team.

Girls Basketball

The Girls Basketball Team finished with a 19-4 record (17-3 Regular season) and won the MVC 2 Championship for the fifth year in a row. The girls had a great tournament run as well; they advanced to the Division 1 North Semi-Final where they lost a close game to Andover HS. Coach Branco was named the MVC Coach of the Year, Claire Markey (MVC Player of the Year) and Sara DaSilva were named to the All Conference Team.

Gymnastics

The CHS Gymnastics team had another strong season and competed well in the very strong MVC. The team worked hard all season and competed their best at the season ending MVC/DCL gymnastics competition. Alyssa Pasciuto, Mallory Armstrong and Natasha Santhanakrishnan were all named to the MVC All Conference Team.

Boys Ice Hockey

The Boys Hockey Team finished the regular season with a 10-9-1 record and then had a memorable run in the state tournament. The boys advanced to the Division 1 North Tournament Semi-Finals after upsetting Melrose and

Newburyport on the way. The boys fell to Arlington in the Semi-Final game in front of a packed Chelmsford Forum. Patrick Couillard was named to the MVC All Conference Team.

Girls Ice Hockey

The Girls Hockey Team had a great season under first year coach Jason Fletcher, finishing 13-6-3. The girls advanced to the 2nd round of the tournament before losing to state finalist Acton Boxboro 3-1 in a great game. Rachel Bossi, Julieanne Sheehan and Caitlyn McCabe were named to the MVC All Conference Team.

Boys and Girls Ski Team

The boys and girls ski team had one of their best seasons ever competing in the Mass Bay West League. Eight of our skiers; Connor Hart, Ryan Hart, Jay LoPresti, Matt LoPresti, Kyle Hansen, Kinsey MacNamara, Carolyn Paul and Amanda Holmsten all qualified for the state race and were all named to the league all-star team.

Boys Swim and Diving

The swim team really came on at the end of the season after an average regular season. The boys peaked at the right time surprising everyone but themselves by winning the MVC Conference Meet at the end of the season. Coach Vitale was named MVC Coach of the Year and team members Andrew Majeski (MVC Swimmer of the Year), David Cote, John Phinney and Kurtis Platteel were named to the MVC All Conference Team. Majeski also went on to win the Div. 1 State Meet and earned Boston Globe and Herald All State honors.



This year, student Karen Keller received an Honorable Mention Award for her work in the 2015 Massachusetts Wildlife Junior Duck Stamp Art Contest. This is quite an honor, as this year, over 450 students across the Commonwealth participated in this program. The Junior Duck Stamp Program was launched in 1991 by the US Fish & Wildlife Service with the aim of increasing young people's awareness of the importance of preserving wetland habitats and the delights of wildlife. In 1992, the US Fish and

Wildlife Service printed the first ever Junior Duck Stamp with the funds going towards scholarships and educational grants.

I am happy to announce that this spring, two CHS students were accepted to participate in the prestigious Art All-State Program!

Each year, the Worcester Art Museum sponsors a workshopbased weekend for top junior high school artists. These juniors have been recognized and nominated by their teachers as the most promising and outstanding artists of their grade. Following nominations, the students are further screened through interviews and portfolios of their art, reviewed by art educators. Art All-State is an intense 2-day workshop where art students collaborate in groups and are overseen by professional artists from varied fields to create a room-size original environmental art piece. Throughout this process, students meet other gifted art students from around the state. While students collaborate, brainstorm, experiment, and construct their art, they gain knowledge, inspiration, and new conceptual ideas and have a lot

of fun in the process. This year's Chelmsford Art All State Winners were Karen Keller and Matt Piper.

In addition, art students in grades K-12 from across Massachusetts were selected to display their creative works at the State Transportation Building in Boston. This multimedia exhibit was sponsored by the Massachusetts Art Education Association (MAEA) in conjunction with Youth Art Month, a national celebration that emphasizes the value of art education for all children and encourages support for the quality art programs in Massachusetts' schools. 

- You went snow skiing everywhere: Colorado, Utah, Canada, California, and Italy. At this time, you were a certified ski instructor.







She joined me and was so glad to know I was enjoying the view. She said to me, "Now you know why I don't have a TV up here. When I need to know how the Red Sox are doing, I turn on the radio." What a peaceful time that was, "listening" to the quiet and watching nature.

She sold that beautiful home. Her children worried about her being tucked away so far from home. Her closest neighbor up there was eight miles away. She then bought a bungalow in Westford, (the old Wyman's beach) and once again, she invited us for a weekend. We had such fun and Kathi was still surrounded by nature. A pool and a lake instead of the salt water basin, but birds still visited.

When we were in Maine so many years ago, I placed my coffee cup on the porch railing and snapped a photo of it. Later, I painted a picture of that scene on a large pine knot and gave it to Kathi. I painted the same for myself. It's been in my shop for years and I just brought it into my home. Today I look at it differently.

I'll always treasure that great time sitting in the rocking chair, sipping coffee, and listening to Kathi chatting away about life and not letting her health issues prevent her from doing what she needed to do to live life to the fullest. Kathi was working hard putting together our 50th class reunion at the time of her passing. The rest of the committee will work hard without her leadership but we will do it for her and because of her.

I'm so glad I had the chance to become Kathi's friend. I'll reflect on the time spent in her circle. When I look at my painting, I'll hear her words and be warmed by that amazing smile of hers. She had a lot to overcome with her diabetes, and she did so with grace, humor, and hope. Kathi, you are missed and with your spirit to guide us, we will carry on.

I have more sad news of another classmate's passing. Paula Smith passed away this past spring. I last saw Paula at her brother Ken's ('75) wedding to Lynn Roche ('76) in the mid-80s. We laughed together about our times at CHS, mostly about gym class - ugh! It wasn't our favorite subject! We found it messed up our hairdos. It was fun reminiscing about running around that track, and playing field hockey and softball. That was 50 years ago and makes our 50th class reunion even more important me, and somewhat poignant.

Hopefully, all our classmates will be at the Radisson in Chelmsford, Columbus Day weekend. We have the ballroom booked Saturday night, October 10, 2015.


