As another year comes to an end, we have so much to celebrate. The Marble Collection is a non-profit organization that publishes the only statewide print and online magazine of the arts. It features jury-selected artwork and creative writing by Massachusetts students in grades 8-12. Anna Kehoe's original artwork was prominently displayed and mentioned for being a wonderful piece of art. You can see Anna's artwork as well as others on the website themarblecollection.org.

Our first Robotics Team had VERY successful competition at the World Championships. They were picked as part of an allegiance of 4 teams that won the division championship. In addition, a subset of our students worked on challenges sponsored by FEDEX and their team won a \$10,000 grant. They worked so hard and their efforts "paid" off.

Keeping in the same vein with technology, our premier Programming C teacher (Nancy Kiernan-Bell) is working on partnership with a former CHS graduate, Sean Harrington. Sean is the Director of Technology for the New England Patriots. He is coming to talk to our students about the wonders of computer science. Sean wants to get students and student athletes excited about the world of computer science. For the New England Patriots, Sean uses Software and Data Science to write programs and algorithms using measurable data (40yd dash, vertical jump, etc.) in order to evaluate talent. I would surmise that Sean is Bill Belichick's right-hand man. Sean and Nancy want to use his experience with the Patriots to make Computer Science approachable,



relatable, interesting and "cool" to our current students. I cannot think of a better person to do this. Having a young and successful CHS graduate mentoring current students is a great endeavor.

Our Theatre Guild keeps collecting awards and accolades. The 2017-2018 TAMY Awards nominated CHS for Best Overall Production for their musical, "Anything Goes." Sydney Baron was nominated for Best Actress. Phillip Ferdinand was nominated for Best Supporting Actor and Allison Dorsey was nominated for Best Featured Actress. It feels like our Theatre Guild is creating the next Meryl Streeps and Tom Hanks of the world. Next year's musical will be "Fiddler on the Roof." I cannot wait to see this production.

The Thursdays, CHS Acapella Group, were one of only 10 schools from across the country who were selected to perform at Carnegie Hall. Not many people can say that they did this...not even well-seasoned professionals. This would not be possible without the guidance and leadership of our choral teacher, Amanda Roeder.

CHS continues with strong performances athletically. Our wrestling team won their 2nd State Title in the last three years. They were led by two New England standouts, Michael Veccione and Evan Goodall. This means that head coach, Bruce Rich, won his 10th state wrestling title in addition to the state titles he won in softball and football. Not many coaches can say they won a total of 13 state titles in three different sports.

Ryan Hart finished as the season's league point leader in skiing. This has not happened in a long time. Our Boys' swim team placed 2nd in the MVC with Aaron Zhu finishing 1st in the state in the 100-yard breaststroke while Ben Cote finished 2nd in the state in the 100-yard butterfly.

Prior to the season, people were talking about our boys' basketball program being a "rebuilding" year due to the number of seniors who left last year. Coach Micol coupled with the dogged determination of this team, never let "rebuilding" be part of their vocabulary. They were giant slayers. During the regular season, they pulled great upset wins over toughranked MVC opponents. They marched to the semifinals in the north sectional state tournament before losing to Everett. We are so proud of their performance.

As I write this letter, our boys' and girls' lacrosse teams are leading their divisions and doing so in a dominant fashion. We look forward to their upcoming games in the state tournament. I wish all of our spring sports programs the best of luck.

Finally, congratulations to the graduating class of 2018. They were wonderful kids. We will miss them.

# MANOGNYA SRIPATHI

## **SENIOR** Profile


Like any senior in Chelmsford High School, Manongya Sripathi has spent the majority of her time in May looking ahead: studying for the AP exams; preparing for senior week activities like prom; and of course, getting ready to graduate. In CHS she has kept up excellent grades and participated in various extracurriculars, her favorites being Speech and Debate Club and Science Team.

"I do public forum debate, and I really love it," Manognya confides as she describes what she does on the Chelmsford Speech and Debate Team, which she joined in her junior year. "It's really a great experience." With this team, she has competed in tournaments across Massachusetts. When she talks of debating people from China and Mexico while at a competition at Harvard, the excitement in her voice is palpable. One of her favorite memories of high school is of a debate tournament in the largest city in America, when she got the chance to go "roaming around New York City for an entire day" with her friends.

Science team, too, has offered many opportunities. Manognya has gone to states and invitationals with her team. "I do mostly test events, and I also help out in the engineering events," she explains. She specializes in test events focused on chemistry and biology, and helps out wherever her team needs help in building mechanisms for the engineering events. "Right now Chelmsford is ranked as one of the top five teams in the state--and there are about seventy teams," Manognya informs. "We put our full efforts into the state competitions." All three events she competed in in her senior year resulted in Chelmsford being ranked within the top ten teams.

Although Manognya thrives as a debater and member of the science team in Chelmsford, she has many other interests as well, including badminton, tennis, swimming and singing. In college, she hopes to pursue singing in an acapella fusion group that blends traditional Indian songs with western ones. It just so happens that the school she will be attending has such a group.

Manognya will be attending Georgia Tech in Atlanta this coming fall to pursue Biomedical Engineering. "There are a lot of companies like Philips that are focused on medical devices, and that's the line I hope to go in," Manognya divulges when asked where she wants to go with her degree. Her father is the biomedical engineer who introduced her to the field. She names him as the person who has impacted her most in her life. "I feel like most of what I learned, I



learned from him," she recalls. "He's the one who told me it was going to be okay when we moved, and he made sure that it has been okav."

The Sripathi family moved from Bangalore, India in the autumn of 2012. Manognya finished her sixth-grade schooling and moved from her hometown to Chelmsford, where

she has been ever since. She has faced a few difficulties in America, including the culture of colleges here. "In India everyone stays at home and goes to college, so it's kind of a little weird to think that suddenly this is an option and I'm going to be thousands of miles away from home, and it's a little daunting--intimidating--to do that, but I'm excited." In classes such as English, too, she has had to learn to adjust and define her own limits. "I don't regret not taking AP English this year because that many essays, that many books, are just overwhelming for me, especially since English isn't my first language," she explains. She later admits she would have been capable of taking the advanced english class at the cost of overloading herself. "I wish there was an honors level," she laughs. But even though she didn't come into the Chelmsford school system until she was twelve, Manognya has never experienced the challenge of being a social outcast.

"I'm definitely very sad about [leaving CHS], especially since I'm going really far away for college," she muses. "Chelmsford is my second home. Chelmsford took me in--CHS took me in. The people here are great and I'm going to miss a lot of people. I was talking to some friends the other day and they couldn't wait to get out of here, but I'm not like that. I'm really going to miss this place."

In Chelmsford, Manognya has learned that if she works her hardest and has hope, she will do great things in her life. In Chelmsford, she has found out that doing the things she loves (whether that be singing or debating or playing badminton) can help her push through stressful times. In Chelmsford, she has discovered that her favorite flavor of ice cream from Kimball's Farm is Blueberry Pie. She has been recognized by teachers for her academic excellence, made friends that will last for her entire life, and managed to survive high school. She has uncovered her love of engineering, her not-so-love of writing, and her own uniqueness within the borders of a small town called Chelmsford.

And while she is looking ahead at the AP tests, senior week activities and graduation that demand attention from all the seniors of CHS in the month of May, and the departure from this small town that will follow shortly after, she still finds time to share a joke or two. When given the prompt of what she would ask to whomever she choose, she replies, "I feel like I'd have to ask Newton why he had to sit under the apple tree, because he just made physics a lot harder for all of us."

## MICHELLE MAYBURY '82

## **ALUMNI** Profile

### More than Just a Town

Chelmsford is more than simply a town to Michelle (Hamel) Maybury '82. The energetic wife and mother of three has lived and thrived in Chelmsford nearly her entire life, first attending the Chelmsford schools and then returning to live in the town several years after she married her husband, Mark, whom she met on the stairs of Chelmsford High School. In fact, the Chelmsford community has had such a profound impact on Michelle that she and Mark ultimately chose to return to the town permanently to raise a family of their own, in the hopes that their kids would find as much success as they did. Upon moving back, Michelle sought to find ways to give back to the town that helped her accomplish so much. She currently sits on the board of the Chelmsford High School Alumni Association (CHSAA), serving as recording secretary and helping fundraise and plan for future CHSAA ambitions, and has been a major contributor to several Chelmsford High School events.

In high school, Michelle enjoyed studying foreign language and was a member of the French Honor Society. After school, she worked making pizza at Papa Gino's and at Hit or Miss, a women's clothing store in the Chelmsford Mall. The principal of the high school at the time was George Simonian, who would later nominate Michelle for her current position on the board of CHSAA as recording secretary. Michelle believes CHS is still the same now as it was years ago, when she was a student there.

"Chelmsford High School hasn't really changed that much," she ponders. "When I look through CHS now, it looks very much the same. Some of the lockers have changed," she adds with a laugh.

After graduating from CHS, Michelle attended Bay State College in Boston, where she received a degree in business. After working as a reservationist at Delta Airlines for two years, Michelle transferred to Merrill Lynch.

"I was studying to be a stockbroker at that time. I worked for the VP as an administrative assistant. I worked there through the last part of college and after college and I did that for many years," she explains.

Meanwhile, Mark, her fiance at the time, was across the ocean at Cambridge University completing his Master's in computer science. He had taken a break from his Air Force ROTC commitment in order to do so. "When he came back we had seven days to plan our wedding," Michelle recalls with a smile. Immediately after the wedding, they packed up their belongings and prepared to leave for the

weapons lab in Albuquerque, New Mexico, fulfilling Mark's ROTC service requirement. However, an unexpected turn of events that kept the newlyweds on the east coast was a turning point for Michelle.

"In the last couple of days they changed [our destination]," Michelle says. "We ended up going to Griffiss Air Force Base in Rome, New York. It snows from September until May," she says, cringing.

Griffiss opened Michelle's eyes to how truly lucky she was to have grown up in a community as tight knit as Chelmsford. Michelle describes Rome as "a very depressed community."

Michelle explains that many Rome citizens worked in the Revere Copper Plant prior to its closing. "When we moved there they shut down the Revere factory, so a lot of people who lived there and worked in that Revere plant lost their jobs," Michelle continues. "It was tough, coming from Chelmsford, a vibrant community with so many different things. Moving there, it was actually really like a culture shock."

After completing his service at Griffiss, Mark got a job at the Mitre Corporation in Bedford. Glad to be coming home to Massachusetts, Michelle and Mark searched for a place close to Bedford to call home for themselves and their newborn son, Zachary.

After consideration, the couple decided to come back to their roots in Chelmsford. In 1990, they purchased Mark's family's house and have resided there ever since.

"Chelmsford was an obvious choice for us," Michelle says, explaining the reasoning behind the couple's choice to return to their hometown. "We knew we'd come back; we had such success ourselves that we figured it would be a great place to raise our kids."

The town had everything Michelle was looking for to help her raise her family: a strong school system, impressive sports and fine arts programs, and close proximity to both Bedford and Boston, should she decide to go back to work in the city. It was a perfect fit. Michelle was thrilled to be able to send her kids to the school that had helped her accomplish so much.

"CHS provides everything you need if you go for it," she says, explaining why she and Mark decided against private school. "The table is set. There's everything there; you just have to be the one to go and find it." As they send their third and final child off to college this fall, Michelle's statement appears to have rung true.

Since moving back, Michelle has sought to find ways to leave a positive mark on her town. Thus, when George Simonian called her on the phone and asked her to be recording secretary for the CHSAA, Michelle immediately agreed.

"Who can say no to George Simonian?" she chuckles fondly.

As recording secretary, Michelle's duties include taking notes on meetings, documenting how meetings flow, and making note of things that need to be revisited at the next gathering. Michelle also works alongside her daughter and has been able to watch her grow firsthand in her leadership abilities as Julia is one of two student liaisons serving on the board.

Though Mr. Simonian's request was a large factor in her decision to join the board, Michelle was also heavily influenced by the Chelmsford pride that so abundantly radiated from CHSAA events such as the Hall of Fame induction dinner, a favorite of Michelle. "They're such heartwarming events. Chelmsford is just so prideful," Michelle beams.

After becoming a board member, a term of three years is required. After three years is up, the member must be re-elected. Michelle is in the middle of her second year and would love to continue after her three years is up. Her time on the board has shown her how necessary her contribution to the CHSAA really is.

"I see the need now," she explains emphatically. "[The board] is a small group of people that need to do a lot of things. I really saw how few people are actually doing so much."

Every event takes hours upon hours of planning to successfully pull off. It quickly becomes hectic for the small group of people. The CHSAA is always looking for volunteers who can donate any amount of time.

"If they have a few hours where they want to help, we have many jobs," Michelle says. "They just need to call." As someone who stepped up to offer time, Michelle can confidently say that serving on the board has been a great experience.

Each event put on by the CHSAA has a special committee responsible for the success of that event. Currently, Michelle does not serve on any committees, but she is excited to tackle that next responsibility after her youngest child graduates this year and her schedule opens up.

"I definitely will be on the scholarship committee next year," she says excitedly. The Scholarship Awards Night is another personal favorite of Michelle's. In fact,

the Maybury family established a Maybury Family Scholarship of their own this year for a deserving student going into a STEM field.

"Seeing generation after generation thrive is very meaningful," Michelle remarks. Laughing, she recalls the events of this year's Scholarship Awards Night.

"Towards the end of the night there were no more people to present, so Lou [DiStasi] and I were every other person going out. It's such a prideful night," she says with a grin.

One of the CHSAA's long term goals is to have their own multi-use building next to the high school. The building would serve as a place to hold the decades worth of memorabilia that has built up over the years, and also as a location to hold functions, such as class reunions. Currently, a large portion of the memorabilia is stored at Mr. Simonian's house, and in file cabinets at various locations scattered across town.

"It would just take one fire and so much memorabilia would be gone," Michelle worries. However, though the building is essential for the future of the CHSAA, the endeavor is not going as smoothly as planned.

"We've been trying since 2008, and then the market hit a big boom and crashed. It's taken about ten years to recover," Michelle explains, describing the process as a "massive undertaking." Though the CHSAA has sponsored golf tournaments, cornhole tournaments, and test drives in order to raise money for the privately-funded endeavor, they struggle to meet minimum fundraising goals. "We practically need a private fundraiser," Michelle says seriously.

Despite their fundraising struggles, the CHSAA is an organization that has a lot to offer to alumni. Any CHS graduate can join at any point after graduating.

"It's a great way to keep in contact with all your friends," says Michelle, explaining the various benefits of becoming a member. "It's a great networking tool to figure out if you have things in common with other graduates." Michelle herself is still in communication with many former classmates, including a foreign exchange student from Argentina. The networking opportunities the CHSAA provides are abundant.

In addition, three Lion's Pride magazines per year are included so that graduates can keep up with CHS happenings.

"You become part of a larger community," says Michelle, who is grateful for the opportunity to work alongside the other board members, whom she describes as "a well respected group of people."

"It has already had a positive impact on me," she adds.

Besides serving on the board of the CHSAA, Michelle helped develop the immensely popular after-prom breakfast. The breakfast, which takes place starting immediately after prom and goes until the early morning hours, was created by the Mayburys, who have been DJing the event for 37 years. The tradition began at the Chelmsford Elks. Equipped with only a DJ and some snacks, the Mayburys turned the event into a hit that grew in popularity as years went by. The tradition became so popular that Michelle and Mark went to great lengths to return every year no matter how far away they were.

"When we lived in Rome, we drove 6 hours back so we could DJ. Some years we had kids!" Michelle laughs. Now, their son Zachary has stepped up to fulfil the role of DJ. "We haven't missed one year!" Michelle exclaims proudly.

Her husband also helped to establish the Authors' Wall inside the CHS Learning Commons, where authors who attended CHS can send in their work to be put on display. Michelle hopes to someday help establish the same display for fine arts, where artists and musicians who graduated from CHS can send in copies of their work to be put on display by the art classrooms.

"It just takes people to step up and organize it," says Michelle. She hopes that one day, this dream will come to fruition and be able to inspire current CHS students.

After years of being a part of the Chelmsford community, Michelle still would not want to live anywhere else. She plans on staying here long after her children have all left the nest. The unity and pride that Chelmsford proudly boasts is unlike anywhere Michelle has seen, with the exception of her time in the Air Force.

"The pride that Chelmsford has is very much the pride of being in an armed service family," she says, accolading her community. "You really feel it."

There is nowhere else Michelle would rather be than the town that exudes Lion's pride at every turn. Chelmsford is truly a special community.

"It gives you great roots," she says, summing up her time spent here, in the town that has offered her an abundance of opportunities throughout her life. She regards her volunteering at the CHSAA and in various aspects of Chelmsford High School as a way to thank the town for its endless support.

She sums up by expressing her gratitude. "My husband and I have been in this community forever," she smiles. "It's given us so much that we want to give that back too." •

Chelmsford is one of 4% of districts across the nation receiving the prestigious award

in 2018. The Chelmsford Public School Music Programs play a vital role in our community, and are attractive to families looking to move to a district that excels not only in math, reading, and science, but also in the Fine Arts. The announcement of this year's Best Communities for Music Education designation brings attention to the importance of keeping music education part of school's core education and music's fundamental role in student success in school.

We are extremely proud of once again being recognized by NAMM as a Best Community for Music Education, and this achievement is largely due to the great support that we receive from the Chelmsford Community – thank you!

When one looks at the many successes of the music department, it is easy to see the passion that the students and teachers put into their work.

This year, many of Chelmsford's band, chorus, and orchestra students have worked diligently with their ensemble and private lesson teachers to prepare for state-level music events, including the MMEA's Northeast District, Junior District, and All-State Festivals. The talent and drive of these students is consistently demonstrated through the sheer numbers of students who are accepted each year, and this year has produced another crop of successful auditions!

After auditions of approximately 1,000 students from more than 95 public and private schools held on January 27, students from grades seven through nine were selected to participate in the prestigious Massachusetts Music Educators

Association Northeastern Junior District Festival. The program is offered by the MMEA as an enrichment opportunity providing a musical experience to talented young people. The students were selected to perform in the Junior District Concert Band, Jazz Band, Orchestra, Girls Chorus, and Boys Chorus. They rehearsed with guest conductors and then performed in a concert on March 17.

This year, 26 students from Chelmsford High School, McCarthy Middle School and Parker Middle School in Chelmsford have been selected to participate in the MMEA Northeast Junior District Festival! Out of this group, approximately 450 students from grades nine through twelve were selected to participate in this prestigious Massachusetts Music Educators Association (MMEA) event, 17 of which were from Chelmsford High School. These students performed at a concert in Wakefield, MA on Saturday, January 13.

Those students selected for the All-State Ensembles stayed in Boston March 1-3 to work with

The CHS music Directors work diligently to develop students' skills and to facilitate the audition for and participation in the All-State Festival.

Several Chelmsford Public School Performance Ensembles participated in the 2018 Massachusetts Instrumental and Choral Conductors' Association (MICCA) Concert Band and Orchestra Festival, held from March 22-25 at several different sites throughout the state. Over a hundred ensembles participated throughout the threeday event. The festival, sponsored by MICCA, seeks to encourage and support the development of high musical standards. The MICCA Marching Band, Choral, Concert, and Solo and Ensemble Festivals provide a forum for musical groups to be evaluated by qualified adjudicators. Participation in the festival also affords young musicians and their directors the opportunity to observe the varied performances of other groups from around the

At every festival, MICCA intends to present educational experiences for all who participate. The evaluation process identifies a standard of excellence with which each group can compare. Every group is evaluated in relation to the standard of excellence rather than in relation to other groups, and each performance is scored on a medal system based on a rigorous rubric.

All of the Chelmsford Performance Ensembles did an outstanding job, and the students and directors are to be commended for their preparation and participation.

CPS is extremely proud of the two ensembles that won gold medals at this year's MICCA festival. A gold medal rating is stated as "superior" on the festival scoring rubric. This festival allows ensembles from all across the state to play a competition program for a panel of three adjudicators, many of which come from across the nation. The ensembles are not rated against each other, but all are scored based on the criteria listed in the rubric. The adjudicators take into consideration age ranges in each group and the level of difficulty of each musical piece performed. The highest a group can earn is a 45 on the rubric. The McCarthy Festival Band's overall score was a 43. This was the second gold medal awarded to this

group (the other gold rating was earned in 2017).

The group meets after school for approximately one hour each week. The students work with Directors Allison Lacasse and Sean Wright, both co-directors of the McCarthy Band Program and the Chelmsford Public Schools All Town Wind Ensemble.

The CPS All Town Wind Ensemble also earned a gold medal rating at the festival on Sunday, March 25, 2018. This is the group's first ever gold medal. The adjudicators were impressed with the quality of the performance considering there are 6th through 12th graders performing advanced literature. Each festival performance culminates with a 30-minute clinic with one of the judges, which gives the students a chance to hear first-hand feedback from one of the professionals who scored their concert.

Both bands earned the opportunity to perform their program in the MICCA Gold Medal Showcase Concert at Mechanics Hall on Sunday, April 8. The All Town Wind Ensemble also performed this year in a concert on the main stage at Carnegie Hall in New York City as part of the National Band and Orchestra Festival. It should be noted that the directors of the All Town Wind Ensemble and the McCarthy Middle School Band received the 2018 Massachusetts Music Educators Association Music Advocacy Award at the annual All-State Conference in Boston on Friday, March 2, 2018. The directors were selected among applicants across the state to receive this award.

The Music Advocate Award is

presented annually to outstanding individuals, organizations, or community leaders who have demonstrated advocacy for music education in the schools of Massachusetts. The award may be given to any individual, organization, or community leader who qualify under the following criteria: 1) Is active as an advocate for music education in the school or community. 2) Shows strong leadership in the community and good rapport with teachers, parents, students, and Administrators. 3) Candidate's efforts have led to a financial commitment for music education by the school system and community. 4) Candidate's efforts have led to improvements in curriculum, budget, or enrollment in the music program.

This is the fifth year that Lacasse and Wright have been co-directing the McCarthy Band Program in Chelmsford together. As a team, they direct the 5th through 8th grade band ensembles, the McCarthy Festival Band (competitive ensemble), and the Grade 6-12 CPS All Town Wind Ensemble. Outside of the school setting, the directors actively fundraise and promote the program within the community to provide their students musical exposure to professional musicians, new equipment, and instruments. Their efforts also lead to meaningful field trips to performance venues where the students can engage with professionals in the industry. The overall culture of the band program at McCarthy is one of excitement, inclusivity, and robust musical experiences for students and families.

In other music news, the CHS a cappella group The Thursdays, directed by CHS Choral Director Amanda Roeder, have been selected as one of the ensembles representing North America at the International Championship of High School A Cappella (ICHSA) Festival for the second consecutive year, and performed at Lincoln Center in NYC in April!

This year, there were 3,117 performers in 204 groups from high schools across 28 states competing in the ICHSA tournament. The tournament structure includes 8 regions: Great Lakes, Mid-Atlantic, Midwest, Northeast, Northwest, South, Southwest, and West. All regions except for the Northwest and West held quarterfinal rounds, where the top two or three groups from each quarterfinal will move on to the regional semifinal. The top group from each semifinal will advance to the ICHSA Finals at Lincoln Center in New York City. As the top scoring group at the semifinal, Chelmsford High School's The Thursdays ensemble will represent the ICHSA Northeast for the second consecutive year.

The Thursdays are also currently featured on *Sing That Thing!*, WGBH's televised competition for New England singing groups. Throughout the season, seven new episodes will showcase performances from 18 ensembles, representing genres from barbershop and pop to jazz and classical in three age-based divisions. Expert coaches will guide the groups, offering constructive suggestions throughout the season and will ultimately decide which groups will be named the winners in each division.

"Singing brings people of all walks of life together – it's a tradition that's thriving right here in Boston, across New England and around the world. Sing That Thing! celebrates the power and emotion of vocal music, as well as the unique sounds from diverse communities in New England's evolving a cappella scene," said Liz Cheng, WGBH's general manager for television and co-executive producer of Sing That Thing! "I hope viewers will tune in to WGBH 2 each week and be inspired by the talent, creativity and uplifting performances of these 18 unique groups."

Each of the competing groups belongs to either the high school, collegiate or adult singing group division. The coaches will select two groups from each division to perform on the finale, when one group from each category will be selected as the winner in their division.

The Sing That Thing! coaches are Anthony Trecek-King, president and artistic director of the Boston Children's Chorus; Annette Philip, a vocalist, composer/arranger and faculty member at Berklee College of Music and winner of the 2017 International Championship of A Cappella with her quartet, Women of the World; and Jared Bowen, WGBH News executive arts editor and host of WGBH's Open Studio with Jared Bowen, Boston television's only local arts series. Together, the coaches provide constructive feedback to each group and determine which will advance to the next round.

The series is produced by public media producer WGBH, in partnership with Emerson College and with WGBY (Springfield, MA,) Maine Public, New Hampshire Public PBS and CPTV - Connecticut Public Television. *Sing That Thing!* will be seen in every state in New England thanks to these partner stations.

CHS student and member of The Thursdays, Emily Bruce, was honored in the 2018 Massachusetts Music Educators Association (MMEA) Young Composers Forum at the All-State Conference.

Emily submitted an original a cappella composition that was performed by The Thursdays, "Easy As I Go," to the MMEA for consideration in order to be accepted in this year's Young Composer's Forum. This process was facilitated by her choral director, Amanda Roeder. The Young Composers Forum is an academic enrichment program for high school music students in Massachusetts. MMEA recognizes and encourages students who are aspiring composers by hosting a special conference session at All State.

During the session, Emily met with other student composers, as well as an expert "in-the-field" educator/composer who provides inspiration and constructive feedback. This year's professional composer was Boston University faculty member Dr. John Wallace.

Bravo to the CPS Music Faculty for their dedication and successes this year!

In Spring theater news, the CHS Theater Department thrilled crowds with their original competition play, A Head of the Class. In March, the Chelmsford High School Theater Guild hosted the preliminary round of the Massachusetts Educational Theater Guild (METG) Drama Festival for the sixth consecutive year under the direction of Lauren Cochran and Craig Roberston, This is the 87<sup>th</sup> year that the METG produced its annual Drama Festival. Out of more than 110 schools that participated in this year's Massachusetts Educational Theater Guild (METG) Drama Festival, Chelmsford High School was one of 14 finalists that advanced to the State Finals after preliminary and semi-final rounds with their original farce, A Head of the Class. This festival was held at the Back Bay

Events Center in Boston on March 22, March 23, and March 24, 2018.

In addition to being one of the 14 state finalists, members of the CHS Theater Guild were also the recipients of many awards at each level of the competition.

# HALL OF FAME Review

They've been holding this Hall of Fame induction for deserving Chelmsford High School alumni and educators for 28 years, but each new one seems to bring an evening of eye-popping accomplishments, poignant remembrances, as well as a few surprises.

As always, CHS Alumni Association Executive Director George Simonian opened the evening March 24 at the UMass Lowell Inn & Conference Center with a geographic table setter, noting this year's inductees came from all walks of life and from as far away as Glendale, California, to as close by as Chelmsford.

"I'm reminded of what a wonderful job CHS does in preparing its students to reach their full potential," CHSAA President Terry McSheehy marveled, in his greeting to the packed grand ballroom.

McSheehy pointed alums and others gathered to the association's website, chsalumni.org, where a wealth of history, pictures, videos of past induction ceremonies and upcoming events, scholarship opportunities and other CHSAA business is updated regularly.

CHS Principal Steve Murray thanked the association for its SHARE mentoring program and rattled off many of the school's recent accomplishments, including a state wrestling title, the school's

13th, 10 of which he noted were under longtime coach Bruce Rich. He also noted CHS' academic strength, noting the school is a Level 1 school and in the top 25 percent of all high schools in the state, and boasts 11 National Merit commended students.

And now for this year's inductees:



#### Joshua Blagg

Josh Blagg, a Class of 1991 inductee, was an award-winning swimmer at CHS, a 4-time Lowell Sun All Star and a record-holding swimmer at the University of Richmond. Returning to Chelmsford, Blagg earned his masters in education from UMass Lowell and taught elementary and middle school before moving up to CHS, where he's now a dean. Like his mentor, and nominator, former CHS Principal Al Thomas, Blagg has also been a highly successful CHS swim and dive coach.

In his speech, Blagg likened himself to George Bailey in "It's a Wonderful Life." While many friends left town to achieve greatness, he stayed behind, and he's very clear on why.

"It was here, specifically at Chelmsford High School, where I found a community filled with people who invest in one another and embrace and support those in need. When I was a sophomore at CHS my mother Paula lost her nearly four-year struggle with brain cancer," Blagg related. "My mother was a force of nature that had the innate ability to infuse those around her with belief in them while appealing to their better nature.

"As you can imagine her loss was devastating to my family. Looking back on the experience I am humbled by the care, dedication, and empathy extended to me and my family by the Chelmsford community. My swim coach Al Thomas, my history teacher Bernie Battle, my English teacher Lorna Hallal, and Dean Ed Quinn were bedrocks of support for me as I struggled to keep my head above water that year and those that followed. Their support, along with my friends and family, inspired me to become a teacher and later a Dean at Chelmsford High School."

"Whether it was teaching or coaching swimmers the common element was my passion for working with the kids. I love igniting the spark within a student, fostering their belief in themselves, and urging them to chase their dreams," he said.

Blagg noted that today's students face greater challenges

than any previous generation, and yet they amaze.

"They are more tolerant of differences and accepting of change than any previous generation," he said. "Our students are our best ambassadors and provide real hope for the future. I am so proud of this honor and promise to continue to fully invest myself in supporting and empowering our students. CHS is truly a great school and I am proud to be a small part of it."

#### **Carolyn Clancy**



Carolyn Clancy, a Class of 1978 grad, was a National Honor Society student and an All-State field hockey team player at CHS. She continued her excellence in the classroom and on the field at Assumption College, graduating with a degree in math and business. She earned an MBA in business management from Babson College 1989.

She's held many top positions for a host of companies, most recently being named executive vice president/head of funds network for Fidelity Investments. She has also been recognized by many organizations, including her alma mater, for her philanthropic efforts.

Clancy said that as she thought about the honor of being inducted, three things came to mind. "First, it's the importance of having great leaders. We had such high quality teachers and administrators ... I've thought so much about this over the years. If you want to get things done well, and excel... and have the people around you excel, it's just critical to hire amazing talent.....whether for a sports team, a faculty, or, for me, a business team," Clancy said. "Chelmsford High certainly has done this...

Over the years, 8 Clancy kids, 1 sister-in-law, and 9 of my nieces and nephews have benefited from a Chelmsford education!" she continued. "We all are beneficiaries of these talented leaders."

The second lesson, she said, is that you can be competitive but also be nice and compassionate at the same time, a lesson well-instilled in her Chelmsford education.

Third, the power of collaboration, Clancy stressed, was integral in her success and attaining a scholarship for college, as it was actually football coach Tom Caito and other male figures at the school who helped her navigate the scholarship process after Title 9 was passed.

"I'll close with thanking my parents... so many of you know my parents – they have always been SO active in our lives and in the lives of this community," she said. "..... I could talk all night about what they've taught us all, the impact they've had on our lives, but mostly just how remarkably they have lived their lives. My Dad passed away about a year and a half ago, but my Mom is here tonight. Mom—this is for you and Dad!"

#### Valerie Diggs

Valerie Diggs was honored for her longtime commitment to the Chelmsford schools as an innovative librarian, putting CHS on the map with the Learning Commons concept, creating in 2008 a space where students could both learn and socialize. The effort earned her the Champions for Children award upon its opening. She retired from Chelmsford as libraries coordinator and now works at Lowell Catholic High.



Diggs, though educated in the Somerville and Medford schools as a child, ultimately settled in Chelmsford to raise her family, with all four of her children graduating from CHS. She credits her husband, Glenn, for pointing her to Simmons College Graduate School of Library and Information Science in 1993, telling her, "You belong in this program."

Diggs' career in Chelmsford's school libraries began in 1995 at the elementary level and ended with her overseeing CHS and the entire system's libraries.

"While at the high school in 2002, I saw a need to revitalize the program by adding new and different events to let students and staff know that the high school library was so much more than just books and computers," she said in her acceptance speech.

"The library began to host open mic sessions during all three lunches, with students eating lunch in the library while listening to

their peers, and sometimes even teachers, perform..." she continued. "The idea was to bring as many students into the library as possible and in any way possible."

She called the renovation of CHS' 12,500-square-foot space in 2008 "a dream come true for me. We had transformed both the program and now the physical space to welcome and lead students into the 21st century."

It is the first-of-its-kind high school library space in the country.

"Our rules were simple: respect others and act responsibly. The motto: "Ask; Think; Create" is not only visible to students above the circulation area, but it became our guideline for everything we did," she said.



#### John Krause

John "J.R." Krause, Class of 1986, was a gifted artist in high school, winning multiple competitions and scholarships, including the prestigious Rebello Art Scholarship his senior year. Along with classmate Janet Olney, he proposed and created a mural of the Boston skyline that

graces a wall in CHS Café 1.

When Krause wasn't utilizing his artistic talents in high school, he was playing football, volleyball and skiing. But he followed his passion to Rhode Island School of Design, earning a BFA in 1990. Professionally, he and his wife, Maria Chua, have created two children's books to date, "Poco Loco," and "Happy Birthday Poco Loco." Since 1991, he has worked in the design/animation department for the hit Fox series "The Simpsons" along with fellow CHS alum and Hall-of-Famer Lance Wilder.

"The reason I am here tonight is because of two incredible teachers at Chelmsford High School, my art teachers; Mrs. Paula Brown and Mr. Eric Hoover," Krause said, thanking his mentors. "I have met a lot of my artistic goals, but without Eric Hoover and Paula Brown I am sure my story would be very different than it is. In the 1980's Chelmsford High School had an outstanding art department. Paula Brown and Eric Hoover were the soul and backbone of this department."

Krause said he entered CHS as a mediocre student, but after being complimented by these teachers for his artwork, found an instant connection and a direction.

"Both of these amazing teachers helped me become not only a better artist, but a better student, and a better person," he said. "They did all of this with seemingly boundless enthusiasm, knowledge, warmth and compassion," he said, adding they were real "game changers."

Although he has lived in Los Angeles for nearly 30 years, Krause said he finds much of his inspiration from his childhood and Chelmsford. He suggested YouTube or Google for the Chelmsford icons in "The Simpsons."

Even his new book, "Dragon Night," being released by Penguin Random House in February 2019, has an assortment of Chelmsford references.

"If you look closely you'll recognize some buildings; the old Town Hall—now The Chelmsford Center For The Arts and The Unitarian Church. The Adams Library and the Boston skyline also make appearances on other pages. I took some artistic license... but you can see the inspiration is clearly from here. It's my homage to Chelmsford which will always be a part of me."



#### **Charles Micol**

Charlie Micol was a three-sport athlete and honor roll student at CHS, as well as a member of the Math Team and senior class vice president. In basketball, the Lowell Sun All Star led his team in scoring his senior year and made the team at Boston College as a walk-on. After college, Micol started his own mortgage company and since 2009 has owned Brickhouse Center Sports Grill.

In addition to giving back through fundraisers and sponsorships across town, Micol is also the longtime CHS basketball coach. One of his former players commented, "One of Charlie's best assets is developing young adults into leaders and unlocking potential they never knew existed."

Among the many people Micol thanked in his acceptance speech was Ed Scollan, a CHS alum and former Westford basketball coach who nominated Micol for induction. It's "pretty special having an opposing coach that I looked up to and admired be a part of this," Micol said.

"Chelmsford High School was a special place for me," Micol said.
"Thanks to the all of the Deans, especially Dean Conrad, Whittier House. Had so many great teachers – And to be up on the stage with my favorite teacher from the high school – Mr Pasquale. The best... one of the reasons I went on to major in Mathematics and go to BC."

Micol chuckled at the pre-Hall of Fame press he said he received.

"Played basketball here at CHS & became a basketball star at Boston College." "The 'basketball star' might be a bit of a stretch," he admitted.


"To my former players and coaches - Thank you. You all have helped me become a better person. ...

#### Andrew Pasquale

Andy Pasquale's teaching career at CHS spanned 41 years and he is widely considered one of the best, if not the best, to have ever taught math or anything else for that

matter. One former student called him "the god of all teachers." "He is simply brilliant, fun," said another.

He was the unprecedented threetime recipient of the Senior Class Yearbook dedication and was selected as the graduation speaker for the Class of 1993. He co-authored a textbook for AP Calculus that was used for more than two decades at CHS. He was also recognized as a "distinguished teacher" by the White House Commission on Presidential Scholars."



Perhaps it was the effusive praise leading up to his induction, or just his humility, but Pasquale gave arguably the most concise acceptance speech in the history of the CHSAA Hall of Fame.

"Mathematics was always easy for me. Math was just a language that I was fluent in. Being a math teacher, that was a bit more of a challenge," he said. "I had to learn how to communicate ideas which to me were simple and obvious and transparent and communicate them to students for whom they were, how we say, '50 shades of opaque.' But I think I figured it out.

"I had a chance to brush up against thousands of wonderful students in my career and I hope I left them no worse and a little bit better. So thank you."



#### John Perciballi

John Perciballi, Class of 1975, was a Gold Medal Scholar at CHS and a member on the CHS chess team and later captained both the U.S. Navy and NATO chess teams. He graduated Summa Cum Laude from the University of Vermont, then entered the Navy and was accepted into their medical program at Bethesda, Maryland. He had a decorated 30-year career as a medical surgeon in the Navy before retiring in 2006.

He served as a field surgeon in the Middle East, and was the officer in charge in Operation Iraqi Freedom, providing vital emergency medical services much as those portrayed in the former TV series "M\*A\*S\*H."


Looking around the packed ballroom, Perciballi mused, "This brings back many memories, so I gotta get something off my chest. Final grades are in, right?" he said, sparking plenty of laughter. "The last part of year senior year and I caught a disease, a kind of attitude, I had it and I had it bad. So look, final grades are in, I'm accepted to college, so I wanna hang around with my buddies, play tennis, play chess, play baseball and hang around with my girlfriend, now wife, Brenda, also class of '75. But NO, Mrs. Pelletier's French class. She had an assignment for us, and it was to read 'The

Hunchback of Notre Dame.' So that assignment, it wasn't happening, I didn't read it in French, I didn't read it in English. I read the comic book."

But Perciballi did get into college, and into medical school, he noted. And while serving in the Navy, he helped develop small surgical platforms to help "take care of our wounded warriors."

"But I was fortunate. First, I had parents who valued education, two, a high school that pushed excellence, and three, individual pursuit of education, that had to come from within," he said. "I wanted a career in medicine so I had to answer the question, 'why not me? Why not me?' Once I came to terms with this the progression was, 'I want to do that, to 'I can do that,' to 'I will do that,' and, 'I did it and I had fun doing it.' So thank CHS and Hall of Fame committee for this wonderful gift."



#### Alexander Turner

Alexander Turner, Class of 2001, was in the French Honor Society, played hockey and won a Special Merit Award for completing the NEDC 2000 competition at UMass Lowell. Earning an ROTC scholarship, he had an outstanding career at

Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in aeronautical engineering. He joined the Air Force and became a lead pilot for the legendary Thunderbirds, the branch's demonstration squadron. Today, he teaches new members of the Thunderbirds.

Turner was unable to attend the ceremony, but his sister, Melissa Turner Kozusko accepted on his behalf and delivered his speech. In it, Turner spoke of being humbled and surprised to be included with so many more deserving honorees, adding he feels he probably has more to accomplish before being included. He talked about service, to country, to his fellow man.

"But where does that spark to "serve" come from? How do we grow strong, honorable, moral young women and men with the courage to meet the challenges of their day and lead us to something better?" he wrote. "I believe the answer starts in our homes and is sustained in our communities."

He spoke of how his parents, from Lowell, started their family after being married at 21, and moved from place to place with the Air Force.

"But they chose to settle us in Chelmsford ... not for Sully's, not for the chaos that used to be Chelmsford Center, and not for the CVS and Friendly's that would eventual hire me for part-time jobs (it was all about the employee discount!), but for the reputation of its schools," Turner wrote. "They sacrificed career opportunities and a more comfortable lifestyle for their children's future."

In addition to thanking his parents, he gave a nod to his sisters, Melissa and Deb "for the examples of perseverance and integrity that you set for me as a young man – your strength and character set a standard that has made me a better husband and father."

Turner also singled out Mrs. Germann and Mr. Pasquale as teachers who had a profound impact on him.

"That was my community, and I believe that it's because of people like you that it remains this community. Because of people like you our young ones will feel inspired to fill your shoes, to give more than they take, and to "pay it forward" for all the right reasons. I thank you for what you have all invested into the people around you (which includes me) and for what you continue to give to others."



#### Michael Woodlock

Michael Woodlock, Class of 1990, was a member of the 1987 Super Bowl champion football team, an honor roll student and the recipient of the DECA Club's Service Award and was a volunteer at Sunny Acres Nursing Home. At Assumption College he was named to the 1st team Eastern Collegiate

Football Conference All-Stars and was inducted into Omicron Delta Epsilon, an International Economic Honor Society.

Teaching at Tyngsboro High, he helped EF Tours develop an international travel program that has become a model for other schools to follow. He has volunteered with Habitat for Humanity and led a group of young people at the "Give Kids the World Village" program which helps children with life threatening illnesses enjoy a week of vacation in Central Florida. The program which became such a popular tradition in Tyngsboro that he brought it to Groton-Dunstable Regional High when he became principal there last year.

Woodlock thanked many people, including past inductee Mike Flanagan, the superintendent in Tyngsboro, who he called "one of

my best friends whose professional drive and success I have been the direct beneficiary of."

"The fact that I stand before you is somewhat shocking to me and at the same time I look at my life and think that there has been so much given to me," Woodlock said.

'Dad... Without ever saying a word, you taught me that family comes first, hard-work pays off and that we should never stop learning.... I wasn't happy about it at the time but visiting civil War Battle -fields instead of going to DisneyWorld when I was a kid really paid off."

He also honored his late mother. "I don't think I would have become a teacher without your influence. Mom. I miss you every day. There was no one who gave more than you for all of us kids."

Woodlock said his CHS academic career was hardly a "masterpiece."

"Even before I had met any of these men the names Fletcher, Rich, and Caito were part of typical dinner table conversation at home," he said. "When I entered CHS and these men became part of the fabric of my life I understood. I learned the most important values emphasized at home by playing football for these men and being in their classrooms. My experience here is something I have never forgotten and as a principal my experiences shape my philosophy of educating the whole student."

In addition to thanking those special coaches, Woodlock thanked former teacher John Morse who "saw a teacher in me when I never thought that was a possibility and offered me a teaching job in Florida. It changed my life."

have baby tomatoes on my plants. Here are two pics, one of my potatoes and the other of my raised bed, with tomato plants etc.

- Provide you "naming rights" on rooms within Alumni Hall
